"There aren't any details about ordinary families at the National Archives." These kinds of mythstatements stop genealogists from breaking down all kinds of brick walls using the wealth of information in NARA records.

OUR ANCESTORS AND THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

The myth-conceptions about our ancestors and the records of the federal government are pervasive. We hear it over and over: "There's nothing for me at the National Archives." And nothing could be further from the truth.

Because of the myriad ways in which every family interacts with government at all levels, we need to become NARA Mythbusters and go after all kinds of records held at the National Archives and Records Administration — NARA, for short. And when we do, we discover that the truth is that information that's critical to us as genealogists about your family, my family, and *every* family, really *is* in the National Archives.
