# THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Those of us who live in the Dallas and North-Central Texas area know how fortunate we are to be able to do our research in the Genealogy Section of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library (Dallas Public Library). This extensive collection of research materials and aids is recognized as one of the ten best collections in the United States today. Under Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck's capable and knowledgeable guidance, the collection has continued to grow even in these days of budget cutbacks by the City of Dallas. However, we cannot take the collection and the growth of the section for granted. We, as members of DGS, can continue to do our part to help keep the collection one of the best. DGS supports the Genealogy Section of the Dallas Public Library. It is one of our main objectives as stated in our Bylaws. As a Society, we try to show this support in many ways. We hope you will do the same as an individual. If you have a donation, send it to DGS, Post Office Box 12648, Dallas, 75225 or give it to Lloyd the next time you are at the library doing your research.

The 1989 DGS sponsored project (in cooperation with the Genealogy Section) needs help! To date the section has purchased 90 of the 126 rolls of microfilm, The General Index To Compiled Service Records, War With Spain. This takes the index through the letter "P". Thirtysix rolls of the index remain to be purchased, along with 19 rolls of The Philippine Insurrection. Your tax-deductible donation will help to complete this military index. Each roll of microfilm costs \$20.00 and will be marked with the donor's name. Donations may be made in honor or memory of an individual and that name also listed. Lets all work together to complete this index by the end of May.

The Adopt A Book Project is also in need. The collection will continue to grow, but if the books are unavailable because they are not hard bound, it does us no good. Currently, there remains a large backlog of soft back books and periodicals waiting for bindings and unaccessible to the public. Don't you just know the very book with your entire genealogy all the way back to the immigrant is waiting to be bound. Or, the one quarterly with the one query in it from the only other person in the entire country researching your surname (who just happens to have the family Bible) is waiting with all the other unbound sets of quarterlies on a shelf in the back room. IT COULD HAPPEN! Can you take that chance? For only \$5.00 you can adopt a book or a year's set of quarterlies. Two books for \$10.00, three books for \$15.00 and so on. Think about it. # MAJOR GENEALOGICAL CONFERENCES AND SEMINARS

Samford University Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research will celebrate 25 years of annual sessions with its 1989 schedule. Courses will run from June 18-23, 1989, at the Birmingham, Alabama campus. One must sign up for one course for the full week. The courses to be offered are as follows:

COURSE I: FUNDAMENTALS OF RESEARCH - Anne Dallas Budd and Sandra Luebking, Coordinators. The basics of genealogical research in family records, local and state records, census records and library resources.

COURSE II: INTERMEDIATE STUDIES - Lloyd DeWitt Bockstruck, Coordinator. Research in federal records (land, military, immigration), church records and archival resources.

COURSE III: THE NEWER SOUTH, TRANS-APPALACHIA AND THE GULF STATES - James R. Johnson, Coordinator. Concentrated study of the events and records of the people who settled the states of Tennessee, Kentucky, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas and Florida.

COURSE IV: ADVANCE METHODOLOGY - Elizabeth Shown Mills, Coordinator. Advanced genealogy, research techniques, problem solving. Prerequisite is Intermediate Studies or equivalent as judged by Mrs. Mills.

COURSE V: GENEALOGY AS A PROFESSION - Helen F. M. Leary, Coordinator. Preparation to become a professional genealogist, genealogical teacher, librarian or lecturer, for genealogical writing and publishing. Prerequisite is Intermediate Studies or equivalent.

COURSE S-VI: THE COMPUTER AS A GENEALOGICAL TOOL - Russell and Birdie Holsclaw, Coordinators. Studies, hands-on experience and practical application in the use of computers in genealogy.

COURSE S-VII: GENEALOGY IN THE BRITISH ISLES (July 3-26, taught in Britain) -Marilyn Miller Morton, Coordinator and Director. Three and a half weeks in the British Isles studying and researching in Britain's repositories and libraries.
