During the National Genealogical Society (NGS) Conference (21 May 2004), Dr. Jones received the 2004 Grahame T. Smallwood Jr. Award of Merit from the Association of Professional Genealogists (APG) for his leadership role in raising the standards for genealogical research.

The Fairfax, Virginia, resident is widely known for his lectures and articles on using case studies to demonstrate genealogical problem-solving and using the Genealogical Proof Standard, a method to evaluate the credibility of research conclusions.

Dr. Jones, Co-Editor of the *NGS Quarterly*, has more than 40 years of research and teaching experience in genealogy and education. He served as an APG trustee from 1999 through 2002 and is a trustee and immediate past president of the Board for Certification of Genealogists. An active genealogist since his teens, he teaches genealogical research strategies that have broad application across geographic areas and time periods.

"It Was A Dark and Stormy Night" (or How I Found My Footing in Denton)

Now that I have your attention, I want to tell you an entirely different kind of story. Last year the Ridenours, of the National Genealogical Society (NGS), spent four weeks in Dallas making digital copies of historical documents (for this article, the term "documents" includes photos) in the possession of DGS members. About thirty of our members served as volunteers, some full-time. We were overwhelmed and imaged only a portion of the treasures 123 donors brought in, turning away as many donors as we accepted. It seems that there's an enormous unmet need out there.

Accordingly, after that NGS project hosted by DGS was concluded, I formed an ad-hoc committee to look into our doing this ourselves. In my vision, we would learn from the NGS experience and conduct our own project for our own members. We had learned that the devil was in the details, and that the fun part—digitizing the originals—was just the start. We would also need to properly catalog and share these old documents with others: others in the donor's family and other genealogists via the Internet.

In another activity, I had met Dreanna Belden of the Digital Projects Department of the University of North Texas. They host the Portal of Texas History, which you can visit at texashistory.unt.edu. She invited our informal group to an open house at their digital lab. Bill Deal, Marti Fox, Happi McQuirk, Steve Reid, Bob Souda, Tresa Tatyrek, Al Weeks and I spent a few hours marveling at their technology.

They can copy (using scanners and digital cameras) almost any kind of document. We saw high speed scanners, a camera that can scan both pages of a book without opening it flat and a scanner that can digitize documents fifty-four inches wide. From those scans, they print copies that are difficult to tell from the original. They offered to train us to work on our own equipment. That stuff was neat but what they showed us next was even more significant, at least to me.

We learned their Lab has developed criteria and techniques for labeling digital image files with source data, content, and technical information. All of this information can be automatically indexed.

That's essential to DGS because, if we're to conduct a personal documents preservation project, we must have the tools to efficiently and effectively record information — known as metadata — about each image. Genealogists must be able to find that data and view the digital image. Without this, the value of the project would be greatly diminished.

The other thing that impressed me about the Portal of Texas History was their ability to publish all of their efforts on the web. Before this open house, I had many doubts about whether we at DGS could pull off a similar service for our members. I have delayed this article because I knew that Dreanna was working with her management team to offer DGS a significant perk. She recently called to report that they will give DGS the use of their online servers to publish our members' images on the Internet. Those documents that address Texas history would also be part of the Portal of Texas History.

We can do it. We've seen it done at UNT. All we need now is the will and the volunteers to make this work. That's my dream—for DGS to be a leader in using proven technology for the benefit of our members and the genealogical community at large. The project I envision will take a great deal of work. Some volunteers will need to learn new technologies and help DGS determine what equipment to obtain and operate. Others will work with donors, helping them to prepare their collection and record the names, places, dates, and provenance of each old document. Yet others will assist with organization.

The DPL staff has agreed to help find space in the downtown library. The technology is proven, DGS has the people—but even more important—the need. If we have the will, in future months all DGS members will be able to have their old photos and documents preserved on a CD and, when they agree, published on the web to benefit genealogists and historians. This project was informally discussed with the Board before the UNT visit. A more detailed plan will soon be presented to the Board for approval. Stay tuned.

Glenn is an experienced genealogical researcher, lecturer, and instructor. He graduated with a Bachelor of Business Administration degree from Wichita State University. After serving as an officer in the United States Air Force, he joined IBM in 1960 in Kansas City, Missouri. In 1990 he retired from IBM in Dallas, TX. Since his retirement he has been an active volunteer in several community organizations. His hobbies include travel, photography, and genealogy. Topic: Research Evaluation and Analysis

Lynell is a sixth generation Dallasite, who began genealogical research in 1968 and began working in the first Branch Genealogical Library which opened in Dallas in 1969. She began serving in the Plano Family History Center in 1990 and as the Director since 1997. She has taught family history classes for over ten years. Her family history research has produced a database linking over 33,000 individuals. She has also extracted several records, some of which are available online (four of which are on DGS's website).

Monday, May 23 Speaker: Don Raney

Topic: Wills and the Probate Process

If your ancestor was testate, died with a will, his heirs presented his will to the probate court and

requested appointment of an executor. If your ancestor was intestate, died without a will, the principal heir usually petitioned the court to appoint an administrator. The probate court assigns an identifying number to the estate and a probate packet is created for the court. The probate packet will contain the will, letters testamentary, inventory of the estate, list of beneficiaries, records of public sale, deeds, invoices, receipts and a final accounting of the disposition of the estate.

You should begin your search for probate records in the county where your ancestor died and usually owned property. In most jurisdictions, all of the probate records will be in one series of court books and the probate records may be intermingled with other court records. The older probate records in some counties have been abstracted and published. The best sources for published probate records are county libraries, the home pages for individual counties on USGenWeb, the LDS Library online card catalog, PERSI, and the online card catalog for the appropriate state libraries.

Funeral Consumer Options Follow-Up

A few months ago, the CIG group met and discussed writing and publishing obituary notices. At that time, I mentioned a funeral consumer option

that the audience found interesting and requested details. Here they are:

There is a volunteer consumer organization "devoted to finding funeral services for our members, that are dignified, trouble free and reasonably priced." They contact funeral homes on behalf of their members to establish prices and services and post the information so that members of the organization can make a choice well before any service is needed. As a member you pay a very small fee, select a cooperating funeral home (the choice is not binding in any way – you may select another one later on should you wish), fill out advance paperwork such as detailed biographical information about the person(s) to be covered under the agreement and send copies to both the Society and to the funeral home.

No additional money changes hands and you are making no future financial commitment. You are able to receive reduced charges from the funeral homes at the time you need their service, and your contract for services is with that funeral home, not the Funeral Consumers of North Texas Society.

The organization is actually made up of two parts:

- (1) Funeral Consumers of North Texas, which collects and distributes to members information on prices and services supplied by funeral homes in the service area. Small yearly dues are not tax deductible.
- (2) Funeral Consumers of the Southwest, an informational organization to which yearly dues are regarded by the IRS as tax deductible.

I have used these services several times, and whereas my family desires simple final arrangements, you may request any level of arrangements you wish with the funeral home – but will receive significantly discounted prices.

A. **World War II** Army Enlistment Records 1938-1946

The website description: "This series contains records of approximately nine million men and women who enlisted in the United States Army, including the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps. Although incomplete, the records contain data for a majority of the enlistments in the United States Army during World War II. The bulk of the records conform to the format found on War Department Adjutant General's Office (WD AGO) Form 317 (Enlistment Card) for the period ca. 1941-1945, and WD AGO Form 372 (Enlistment Card) for ca. 1945-1946. Additional records contain data originally recorded on Enlisted Reserve Corps (E.R.C.) Statistical cards. In general, the records contain the serial number, name, state and county of residence, place of enlistment, date of enlistment, grade, Army branch, term of enlistment, longevity, nativity (place of birth), year of birth, race, education, civilian occupation, marital status, height and weight (before 1943), military occupational specialty (1945 and later), component, and box and reel number of the microfilmed punch cards."

B. Records on Military Personnel Who Died, Were Missing in Action or Prisoners of War as a Result of the Vietnam Conflict, 1/20/1967 - 12/1998

The website description: "This series contains records of U.S. military officers and soldiers who died as a result of either a hostile or non-hostile occurrence or who were missing in action or prisoners of war in the Southeast Asian combat area during the Vietnamese Conflict, including casualties that occurred in Cambodia, China, Laos, North Vietnam, South Vietnam, and Thailand. The records derive from information submitted by each of the military services on Department of Defense Form 1300, Individual Report of Casualty. The database has both final and non-final records; a data field in each record distinguishes between them. Final records, also referred to as the 'last' records, represent the most current official information about a deceased casualty or about repatriated personnel; non-final records, also referred to as 'previous' records, are those that precede the final records. Each record includes: the casualty's name, service number, file reference number, date of birth, date of death or repatriation, Southeast Asian tour began, date record processing date, city and state of home of record, the casualty's military service branch, country of casualty, type of casualty, military grade and pay grade, military occupation, service component,

race, religion, length of service, marital status, sex, citizenship, the reason or cause of casualty, whether the casualty involved an aircraft, the status of the casualty's body (whether recovered or not), whether the casualty was posthumously promoted, and the South Vietnam province where the casualty occurred, when applicable."
