#### A Letter from Columbia, South Carolina

At one time, letters to home were a great source of news as loved ones visited distant places. The author uses this form, as part of a series, to describe her research experiences in Columbia, South Carolina.

> Columbia, South Carolina June 30, 2007

My dearest Cousin,

As you can see, I have reached the final leg of my South Carolina journey. I now spend my days at the South Carolina Department of Archives and History (SCDAH). This was my first visit to this facility. SCDAH holds originals of all surviving records related to the South Carolina colonial government, as well as documents related to the earliest years of the state's history. I was certain that I would find some gems here, and I did.

I found excellent lodging less than a mile from the facility, important because state budgets have forced reduction in hours of operation. I was somewhat disappointed that the facility lacked evening hours, but I decided that the limitations offered an opportunity to tour other parts of the city. None of my ancestors resided here, but Columbia is a remarkably interesting place to visit as a tourist. It is a beautiful city retaining Southern charm, architecture, and museums.

My lodging contains a small kitchenette, for which I am grateful. I am growing tired of eating in restaurants. Too much food, too much money that could be spent acquiring documents. I "brown bag" lunch every day. The facility has a small area to eat and to purchase soft drinks, but there are no restaurants within walking distance.

As with other archives, you are limited to what items you may take into the Research Room<sup>2</sup>. Computers were allowed, but no bags or purses. I did persuade them to allow a clear vinyl pouch which held my pc adapter and mouse. But only because it is totally clear and relatively small that they allowed it. Folders are permitted, along with pencils and paper. They provide lockers for anything else. The locker area does not have a table so that you can load and unload these items so I found it best just to carry the barest of essentials into the building. The lockers can hold a medium sized purse, but nothing as large as a backpack will fit into them.

Of all the places I've visited, South Carolina State Archives is one of the most challenging repositories in which to speedily find things. The online catalog is a (Continued on page 156)

good place to start, but much more research effort and staff assistance is required before one can experience eureka! moments. Fortunately, staff members understand that the system can frustrate first time visitors. They are enormously helpful and are among the nicest people you'll meet.

There are several finding aids for county records—which I now understand—but, alas, I would love to see the system simplified. In one case, I used a finding aid to locate one of two paper indexes which sent me to the microfilmed index of the microfilmed records that I ultimately sought. Do you feel from my description that you are lost? I certainly was.

I am an impatient researcher. Several times each day, I began conversations, thusly: "How do I find..." or "Where are the records for...." Only with the kind, patient, and personal attention of the staff was I able to gather a good collection of genealogical gems.

One of my more memorable *eureka!* moments occurred when I located the microfilm image of an ancestor's estate file. I possessed a typescript copy of his will for several years. However, the estate file contained a handwritten copy. It answered a question I had about the transcription done in the 1930s. The typescript contained a crucial error!

If you decide to visit the Archives, you should know that the facility has ample microfilm readers but only two microfilm scanners with attached printers. A short waiting line at the scanner/printers occasionally occurred. There are no scanners which allow one to capture images on a computer thumb drive or CD. Copies of microfilm cost \$.50 each. The only self-serve copier for books charges \$.25 per copy. It too had the occasional waiting line. They do not sell copy cards. There is no machine that will convert bills to coins. The staff, however, will happily make change. Your best plan is to bring a roll of quarters with you when you come.

As with most archives, not all records are microfilmed. I discovered a document that I wanted to examine, the journals for the state legislature in 1819 in which an ancestor was mentioned. Forty years after the Revolutionary War, one of our ancestors—he was tenacious—was still pursuing his claim against the state for services rendered during the war. The staff, always helpful, assisted me here as well.

The process of requesting original documents was similar to other repositories and archives. A staff member helped me submit a form for each document. When the journals were retrieved, staff notified me. I sat at a table in the main Research Room reading documents created nearly two centuries ago, studying the careful penmanship, and searching for a familiar name. Once I found the item of interest, I submitted another form to have the appropriate pages photocopied and mailed to me. Visitors are not allowed to make copies of original documents. The cost is \$1.00 per page/item, plus postage.

Despite my initial frustrations, I had a great and successful visit. All of my frustrations eventually dissolved, except the need to continually feed the copy machines. I am very grateful to the patient and continual assistance of the staff.

On the last day of my visit, I chatted with a staff member about future plans for the Archives. He shared that there is a project underway to improve the process of looking for records, in effect, a searchable online catalog. This database will be more comprehensive than the index that currently exists. This system would replace the current 3-ring binders of finding aids to indexes and microfilm, which currently impede research time. The new system will enable researchers to better prepare for visits to the Archives. This web-based catalog is scheduled to be implemented in November, 2007.<sup>3</sup>

I have truly enjoyed my trip through Southern research, but my brain is tired and my eyes need a rest from the microfilm work. So, Cousin, I shall be returning to Texas soon and I hope to see you when I do. Meanwhile, give my love to family. Your Cousin, Sharon

#### One Thing Leads to Another

Genealogical research is a process, usually a repetitive one. You find one piece and move forward with it and somewhere along the way you have to 'start' at the beginning again. One clue leads to another and all the pieces make the whole.

In putting together the DGS Journal article on the Henry Pollack Trunk Company, that is exactly what happened, one thing led to another. The article was just going to be a little blurb about the company and its owner. The quest (and it was a quest) began with a few pictures of the company inside the shop and store and of the exterior of the building and wanting to know a little about the person behind the business. A search was done of the 1930 census indexes in Dallas County, Texas, and the result was for Henry Pollack whose occupation was listed as the president of a trunk manufacturing company. He was 65 years old. born in Missouri to German parents with his fortyone-year-old wife Walula. I had found the right person. I tried to locate him in the 1920, 1910, and 1900 census to no avail.

Searching the Dallas Morning News archives for more on the business, I 'stumbled' across an article about the death of Henry's father, Samuel. It was a death under unusual circumstances and I tried to find out more about the *inquest* mentioned and still wanted to know more about the *insurance policies* that were held on his life. While searching for the inquest records and looking for probate records I

found a probate record for a Jennie Pollack vs Henry Pollack in 1899. In reviewing those records I found that Henry had married a Jennie Pollack. They had a son Sam and divorced by the 1899 date. That sent me looking for the divorce records and back to census records for information on Jennie and Sam.

The article on the father's death did give me names of some of Henry's siblings and let me know that the family had come from St. Louis, Missouri, and that some of his siblings were still residing there in 1885. Given the St. Louis, Missouri, location, it sent me hunting that area in the 1880 census. At least I wasn't looking in the whole United States for a Henry born in Missouri. I was then able to give names to many of the siblings. I then located the family in the 1870 census.

There were more articles on the company that included a lawsuit between Henry and his brother Charles. The articles were kind enough to include which court and some dates so that many of the records involving the case could be located. Some of the records are on microfilm in the Texas History section of the Dallas Public Library while others are housed there in original paper format.

I found death certificates for as many as I could for the Texas siblings at the Dallas Public Library and obtained the maiden name of their mother. Since some stayed in Missouri and those are on the internet in digital format, I was able to obtain many of those certificates and additional information on their mother since she died there while living with one of her children. I tried to locate a marriage record for Henry's parents, but failed to find one. They moved around a lot as reflected in the states of the births of their children on the census records.

Newspaper articles about Henry's death and subsequently contested will led to more county court records which had to be requested from the court house and copies obtained. Those records included more family names and guess what? I was back in the census records, again.

If you have a story about how one thing leads to another, please consider putting it on paper for publication in this publication. You never know whom you might help with your insight and where it lead you to discover new pieces to your family history puzzle.

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#### **Call for Papers**

The Editorial Board invites submissions to the 2008 issue of the *Dallas Journal*. All topics in Dallas County history and genealogy are welcome. In addition to works of genealogical research, the Editorial Board also welcomes review articles. The deadline for all submissions, including articles and book reviews, is July 1, 2008. Specific guidelines for article submissions are posted below.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR ARTICLES**

**Subject matter**: Dallas Journal is a history and genealogy journal for Dallas County and surrounding communities. It publishes articles relating to all facets of the genealogical, social, political, and cultural history of this geographic region, including (but not limited to):

- · Biographies of deceased residents
- Family group narratives (3 generation is ideal)
- Transcripts and abstracts of civil, religious, and business records not generally accessible elsewhere
- Cemetery inscriptions not available elsewhere
- Bible records
- Obituaries of Dallas natives or residents which were published in out-of-state newspapers
- Transcripts of family records (letters, journals, and diaries) of former Dallas residents

We also consider reviews of books that focus upon Dallas County history or upon genealogical research methods using Dallas County records. "Dallas County" is fairly loosely defined, but could include articles about communities with strong ties to Dallas.

Audience: Dallas Journal is a membership benefit for members of the Dallas Genealogical Society. Our mailing list also includes libraries and genealogical societies in Texas and outside the state. Our readers have a keen interest in

genealogy, but the great majority are not academics or professional genealogists. Therefore, we seek articles that have a wide appeal and are written in an engaging manner. At the same time, we attempt to uphold the highest standards of scholarship: all submissions should be fully documented and will be sent to outside readers for review.

Length: Transcripts and abstracts of historical records may vary widely in length. However, research articles (biographies, local histories, etc.) about 3,000-5,000 words (12-18 pages, typed, double-spaced), plus endnotes, are ideal. Shorter articles are acceptable, especially if they are illustrated essays where the emphasis is on visuals rather than text.

Format: Please submit a digital file of the article in MS-Word or "rich text file (rtf)" format for review and editing. After the article has been accepted and edited, the author will be given a "proof" of the article as it will appear in the *Journal* for final verification of any internet links and placement of illustrations.

**Style**: Notes and citations should follow the Chicago Manual of Style (15<sup>th</sup> Ed.) or Elizabeth Shown Mills' Evidence Explained: Citing History Sources from Artifacts to Cyberspace.

Illustrations: Good illustrations enhance any article. Include photocopies or digital images of any visuals you feel might illustrate the article. The editor will make a final selection and arrange to acquire illustrations from the owner. Any illustrations borrowed from the author will be returned after publication.

**Miscellaneous**: Authors will receive five complimentary copies of the issue in which their article is published; additional copies are usually available at a minimal charge.
