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ANNUAL REPORT 1971

Local History and Genealogical Society

If 1971 can be remembered as a year of progress and growth, the credit must go to the many people who were willing to devote their time and energies to Society affairs. Our thanks to all of you who participated. It behooves all of us to thank our Dallas Public Library personnel for their continued interest and assistance. Mrs. Lillian Bradshaw, Director, Mrs. Lucile Boykin and her staff in the History and Genealogy Department go far beyond the call of regular duty to help us in our searchings, and in maintaining one of the finest facilities in the nation for genealogical research.

Membership: Our membership reached the magical number of 300 during 1971 with 63 new members. Special credit is due Mrs. Duane Cleere, our Membership Chairman; Mrs. Jack A. Morris, Jr., our Communications Chairman; and Mrs. A. W. Gardman, and her faithful telephone committee. Instituted as an economy measure to replace the postcard reminder for the monthly meetings, this committee not only fulfilled that responsibility, but also took opinion polls for program ideas and speakers. The person-to-person contact seems to fill a need in our impersonal age of automation and has met with much approval.

Saddened by the death of three of our faithful members, we have honored their memory with donations to the Dallas Public Library.

Quarterly: Our Quarterly continued its quality of excellence under the Editorship of Mrs. J. R. Macdonald and Ass't. Editor Mrs. Edward Hughston. For the first time, pictures with genealogical interest graced its pages, and an effort to secure advertising was instituted. The Editors join me in thanking all of you who contributed material to make our Quarterly such an outstanding magazine.

By-Laws Changes: A special committee undertook the monumental task of revising our By-Laws. The changes appeared in the September issue of the Quarterly, were presented for adoption at the annual meeting, and were approved by the membership. Mr. Porter Lindsley (Chairman) Mrs. J. R. Macdonald, and Mr. Tom Walker can be justifiably proud of their efforts in updating these rules for Society government, and in the presentation and explanation that led to their adoption.

Genealogy Course: The El Centro College Course for Genealogy continued into its third year under the able direction of Mrs. A. E. Lush and Mr. W. R. Conger. The eight weeks course attracted 36 students, bringing to over 300 the number of persons who have taken advantage of the opportunity to start family research. The interest and enthusiasm for the course was demonstrated by the 92% attendance record. While many of the students have joined our Society, others have been instrumental in starting local societies in surrounding communities.

Finances: As in all other phases of our lives, finances were a cause for serious concern. Since almost the entire amount of the \$6.00 dues goes to printing and mailing the Quarterly, trying to maintain our current membership fee in the face of increasing costs for supplies, postage, and meetings caused us to proceed cautiously. Thanks to the 'watchdog' attention of our Treasurer, Mrs. Billy G. Campbell in handling the dues, paying our bills, and advising the Board, we did operate within our budget and maintain a reserve in the savings account. We begin 1972 with a comfortable balance for operations within our proposed budget. With the success of the Annual Workshop we were even able to donate \$200.00 to the Genealogy Department of the Dallas Public Library. We are again indebted to Judge Dee Brown Walker for his assistance in making our annual income tax report to our Recording Secretary, Miss Nancy Miller, for her excellence in recording our meeting activities; and to Mrs. C. B. Skinner for handling our correspondence.

Meetings: The monthly meetings continued to draw good attendance, both at the noon meeting (YMCA) and the evening meeting (Oak Cliff S & L in Preston Center).

Annual Workshop: The Annual Workshop held in May drew an attendance of 184 and addition of 17 new members. Mrs. Pauline Welch (Chairman) and Mrs. Harold McCrary (Co-Chairman) did a splendid job in arranging the program which presented Mrs. Inez Waldenmaier of Washington, D. C. and a return engagement of Mrs. Mary B. Warren of Daniellsville, Georgia. So many people contributed to the success of the Workshop through their willingness to serve with registration, door prizes, and programming, we could not begin to mention them all.

Seminar: A one-night seminar was held July 13 at the Coco-Cola Bottling Company auditorium for the new members who joined the Society after the Workshop. Mrs. Lush and Mr. Conger presented this program for assistance in basic research which was attended by 34 persons.

Genealogical Society Conference: Based on a suggestion by Mr. E. M. Tipton, President of Ark-La-Tex Genealogy Society from Shreveport, La., a Genealogical Society Conference was held at North Park Inn on July 31. Your officers and directors joined 40 other representatives from 10 Local Societies to discuss and exchange ideas and mutual problems and attempt to coordinate activities.

I hope I am not alone in believing that 1971 was a year of progress and growth. I am much indebted to the Officers and Directors who gave so generously of their time and talents, their cooperation and support; and to you all for your friendship and the privilege of serving as your president.

TERRY'S TEXAS RANGERS

The article quoted below appeared in the September 14, 1861, issue of the Texas State Gazette, published in Austin, Texas by the John Marshall & Co.:

Austin, September 5, 1861

Dr. Worrall:

Dear Sir - The following is a list of the citizens of Travis county belonging to Captain Ferrell's company, who left Bastrop on the 31st ult., to join Col. Terry's regiment, for Virginia, which they respectfully request you to publish.

The person who submitted the article was W. L. Giles, who appears in the 1860 census of Travis Co., a clerk, living with family #764. He is presumed to be a brother of either one or two of the Giles Men in the article quoted above.

The Terry Rangers was organized as the 8th Texas Cavalry beginning 12 August, 1861, when the recruiters went forth from Houston, Texas. The three organizers were: Benjamin Franklin Terry, a sugar planter of Fort Bend Co., Thomas S. Lubbock of Houston, brother of soon-to-be-Governor Francis R. Lubbock, and John Wharton, a Brazoria lawyer. All three served in the Texas Secession Convention. Each in turn served as Commander of the Rangers and each in turn met his death during the war. The Regiment formed up in Houston with from 1200-1600 (accounts vary) and went first to Bowling Green, Kentucky, instead of Virginia. From the first and during the entire war, those who served in the Rangers were volunteers; each man furnished his own horse, arms and equipment.

In the first engagement, on 17 December, 1861, Terry was killed and the group was thereafter known as Terry's Texas Rangers. At the Battle of Shiloh on 6-7 April, 1862, they were a part of the Army of Tennessee and they continued in this capacity until the end of the war. They were at Perryville 8 October, 1862, at Murfreesboro 31 December, 1862, at Chicamauga 19-20 September, 1863, and at many other important engagements. Reports vary on the number of engagements they were involved in...100 being the least and 200 the most.

Of the 2100 who served in the regiment during the war, only 244 were left when the war ended with them in North Carolina under Gen. Joseph E. Johnston. Tom Weston was the final commander of the Rangers. In turn they served under Albert Sydney Johnston, Joe Wheeler, Nathan B. Forrest, Longstreet, John Bell Hood and J. E. Johnston. When the war ended, one article says only 90 remained. Some surrendered in

North Carolina but some made their way to New Orleans on horseback and turned themselves in to get passage back to Texas.

An equestrian statue on the grounds of the Texas capital building in Austin commemorates the Rangers. One of the men responsible for this statue was George W. Littlefield who served as a Major in the Rangers during the war. Littlefield Memorial Fountain at the University is in his honor and Littlefield Dormitory is named for his wife. One Union General, A. Willich, is quoted as saying, "I'd rather have been a Texas Ranger than a general in the Federal Army." When you visit "Six Flags Over Texas" at Arlington, you will see a poster encouraging enlistments in the Terry Rangers in the Confederate section of the park. Along with Hood's Texas Brigade, it is the most famous Texas outfit to serve in the Confederate Army.

Below, I will identify each man listed in the news article earlier quoted, and give what information I know about each of them. All of this group served in Company "D".

JESSEE F. BURDITT, 2nd Lt. - born 30 Sept., 1829, Ala. He married Sarah Ann Hornsby. He headed family #130 in Travis Co. 1860. He was killed in an engagement preceding the battle of Murphreesboro, Tenn., fought 31 Dec., 1862. His tombstone in the Hornsby Cy. below Austin, Texas, says he died 28 Dec., 1862.

F. M. HILL - no data

J. MILAM DUTY - born 1841/2 Texas, the son of Joseph and Louisa Duty. In 1860, he lived with his widowed mother, family #182 Travis Co.

JAMES H. GAULT - born 1838/9 Tenn. He lived with his parents, John M. and Martha Gault, #3, Travis Co. 1860

WAYNE HAMILTON - born 1841/2 Texas. He lived with his parents John Hamilton (Jr.) and Lavina Scott, #297, Travis Co., 1860. His parents came from Terra Haute, Ind., 1838; settled in Travis Co. He died 31 Dec., 1862, at Murphreesboro, Tenn., and is buried in the Old Manor Cy. below Austin.

LEWIS L. GILES - born 1839/40 Tenn., the son of E. S. and N. G. Giles with whom he lived 1860 Travis Co., #347. He was mortally wounded in the first engagement of the Rangers 17 Dec., 1861, at Woodsonville, Ky. (Col. Terry himself was killed also and Col. Lubbock assumed command. They were among 11 killed in this first engagement.)

WALTER WHEELER - no data

JOHN H. WASHINGTON - born 1840/1 Ala. Lived with his parents, T. P. and E. T. Washington in Travis Co. 1860, #104. He was wounded at Shiloh and captured, but survived the war and was living in 1911.

JOSEPH (JOE) B. ROGERS - born 1839/40 Texas, son of James and Rachel Rogers, #14 Travis Co. 1860. Giles mentioned him in his book in an incident occurring in 1863.

THOMAS BENNETT BANKS - born 15 Feb., 1840, Huntington, Carroll Co., Tenn., where his grandfather Thomas Banks was Sheriff. He was the son of Gaston Haywood Banks and Candis Baucom, natives of Wake Co., N. C. They came to Texas 1852 from Marshall Co., Miss. He lived with his parents, #173 Travis Co., 1860. After the war, he married Adeline Tilley Hamilton, first cousin of Wayne Hamilton mentioned above. He died Austin, Texas, 30 April 1925, and is buried in Wood Cy., Travis Co., Tex.

LEONIDAS BANTON GILES - born 2 Oct., 1841, Montgomery, Texas. Lived with his parents Samuel B. Giles and Elizabeth P. Banton in Travis Co., 1860 #362. He was the author of the book mentioned in the Bibliography (to follow). He was wounded at Woodsonville, Ky., 17 Dec., 1861, but served out the war in the Rangers. He died at Laredo, Texas, 12 June, 1922.

CHARLES T. PELHAM - born 1834/5 Ark. Lived with his mother, M. A. Pelham in Travis Co. 1860 # ? . He died in May 1864 in Georgia. Giles describes him as "educated" and as a "Civil Engineer".

B. C. GILES - born 1839/40 Texas, brother of Leonidas Banton Giles mentioned above. Lived with his parents 1860.

FENTON P. BOTT - presumed to be F. Bott, b. 1821/2 Va., single, living with his father, L. Bott, in 1860 Travis Co., #915.

JEFFERSON W. BURLESON - born 11 Nov., 1841, Texas, d. 23 April, 1908, bur. in Rogers Hill Co. just east of Austin. He lived with his father, Aaron Burleson, 1860 Travis Co., #123.

BILL BURDITT - no data. Presume he is related to Lt. Jesse F. Burditt aforementioned.

JAMES C. PICKLE - no data.

JOHN HENRY - born 1837/38 Tenn. Lived with his mother E. Henry, Travis Co. 1860 #95.

JOHN DAVIDSON - born 1843/4 Texas, lived with his parents, Andrew M. and Martha E. Davidson, 1860 Travis Co. #96.

JAMES P. MCARTHUR - very likely the J. T. McArthur, born 1841/2 Texas, living with James Doyle 1860 Travis Co. #69. Wounded at Aiken, S. C., 1865.

SAMUEL PIPER - no data.

JESSEE B. ROWE - no data.

J. V. JONES - born 1842/3 Tenn. Lived with parents Thomas H. and M. L. Jones, Travis Co. 1860, #71. Mentioned by Giles in his book in an incident in 1863.

W. H. ROBERTS - no data.

AARON BURLESON - born 1833/4 Texas. He was the son of James Burleson, and a first cousin of Jefferson W. Burleson mentioned above. His parents were deceased before 1845 and he lived with his brother, Edward Burleson, in Travis Co. 1860, #124. He lived next door to Jefferson W. Burleson.

T. B. PUE - no data.

WILLIAM (BILL) DAVIS - probably the W. B. Davis, born 1837/8 Ga., living in household #726 1860 Travis Co, single. Giles mentions him as being alive in 1911.

M. E. THOMAS - no data.

WILLIAM R. BLACK - became 2nd Lt. at Nolensville, Tenn., Oct., 1862. Wounded at Knoxville, Tenn., Nov., 1863. (Stephen C. Ferrell was promoted to Lt. Col. at Nolensville, having been a Captain when the regiment was formed.)

V. CATRON - born 1837/8 Va. Listed as "carpenter" in 1860, living with family #548 in Travis Co., headed by E. M. Ernst. He was wounded in the leg in an engagement on the Chattahoochie River in Georgia in late July, 1864.

A. T. LOGAN - born 1835/6 Miss. Headed family #171 Travis Co. 1860, with wife E. J. and son T. age 1.

CHARLES H. STONE - could possibly be the C. N. Stone, b. 1841/2 Texas living with his mother M. A. Stone, Travis Co. 1860, #458.

JAMES H. BRENHAM - no data.

JOHN B. RECTOR - probably the J. E. Rector, born 1838/0 Va. listed as "clerk", living in household of F. M. White, #709, Travis Co., 1860. Named twice in Giles' book, the last time being just prior to the Battle of Chicamauga, 19 Sept., 1863.

JOSEPH FORD - no data.

WALTER H. CALDWELL - probably the W. Caldwell born 1843/4 Mo., son of C. Caldwell, a widow, #108 Travis Co. 1860. Was wounded in the hip, disabled and walked with a limp the rest of his life according to Giles. Wounded near Mussel Shoals on the Tennessee River, 1864.

A. H. SEVELLE - no data.

THE GANN FAMILY

NATHAN GANN (1759-1839) OF JONESBORO, TENNESSEE - HIS LIFE AND HIS DESCENDANTS

Progenitor of most of the men named Gann who moved west and southwest in early America was Nathan of Jonesboro, Tenn. He was born in 1759, fought in the Revolutionary War, and says in his pension declaration (S1820) that he was reared in Halifax County, Virginia.

Military Service: In the autumn of 1776 at Halifax he volunteered for military service and was assigned to go on a tour with Capt. Verney of the militia. Then he moved to Guilford County, North Carolina, later settling in what is now Washington County, Tennessee. In March, 1778, he was a lieutenant in Captain Milliken's company of North Carolina militia and served a tour against the Chickamauga Indians; then one under Capt. Hubbard, followed by a tour under Capt. Moore. Later he also went out under Colonels Wotten and Cleveland in an expedition against Indians. For four months he was with Capt. Michael Harrison.

In the winter of 1779 he served almost six months in Capt. Gibson's company as a horseman to range the frontier, whereas for three months he was with capt. Christopher Taylor in Col. Sevier's regiment, during which time he fought in the Battle of King's Mountain. Later he took a tour against the Overhill Indians with Taylor, Sevier, and Campbell. He served at least 22 months as a private and nine months as lieutenant.

His application for pension was executed Sept. 10, 1832, at which time he was 73 years of age and living in Washington Co., Tenn. He died July 18, 1839, leaving a widow named Sarah.

The above account is from his official U. S. army record. It takes no account of his private efforts to advance the cause of American independence and development. In 1800 he was at work as captain of the county militia (see Gov. Sevier's commission book). His neighbors always referred to him as "Captain Gann," and his co-patriots averred he did a captain's work at King's Mountain.

The North Carolina "Revolutionary Army Accounts," under the heading "Special Certificates Paid into the Comptroller's Office," show that Nathan was paid by Carter and Williams for military service, as were also his father, Adam Gann, and his uncle (?) Clement Gann, and his brother Thomas Gann. These vouchers and certificates specify that the service was rendered in Washington and Sullivan Counties.

Land Ownership: Adam Gann, the father of Nathan Gann, had also a brother named Nathan. The son, Nathan, here studied was known in his youth as "Ignatus" to differentiate him from his uncle. After his uncle Nathan removed to Georgia, However, the youth took the name "Nathan," and late in life left proof in Washington County that his full name was "Ignatus Nathan Gann."

Consequently, in 1777 Ignatus Gann bought land in Guilford Co., N. C., from John and Sarah Smith (Bk. 1, p. 414). In 1782 when he apparently went to what is now Tennessee to stay, this land was sold to John Cardwell or Cordwell (Bk. 2, p. 254).

On Dec. 16, 1778, he received from the state of North Carolina a land grant for 341 acres in Guilford County, "on the Mayo Mountain at Sarah Powell's corner" (Deed bk. 1, p. 517). These land acquisitions coincide in time with his entry into the military and settling in North Carolina, where he gradually followed the frontier in its

westward move. He never again resided in Virginia. The land he occupied in Guilford Co., is now adjacent to Madison, having fallen in Rockingham Co., when it was organized. Samuel Gann, Nathan's older brother or uncle, lived for around fifty years on it or adjoining it. By 1790 he was permanently established on the Nolochucky River in Tennessee. According to tax lists assembled by Mrs. Mary H. McCown, the first Gann record in Tennessee is a property tax dated 1781 on Adam Gann, Nathan's father, for 150 acres, 2 horses, 7 cows, total value 427 pounds.

First Marriage: The lineage of Mrs. Erma Brobeck Hansard (D. A. R.) shows that Daniel Gann, born in 1777, was a son of Nathan, but this has not been proved. Nathan probably married first around 1776-7, during the time of his removal to Carolina. At Rusk, Texas (Cherokee Co.), on Jan 15, 1855, Solomon Gann, a proved son of Nathan, left an affidavit in which he refers to his mother as Susan Gann. Solomon was born in 1798. Whether Susan was the first wife is unknown. At Jonesboro, a record states that Nathan was married three times and had about twenty children. His third wife was Sarah Delaney, whom he wed Dec. 24, 1817, in Roane Co., Tenn.

His Plantation: When Nathan removed to the Nolochucky River about 1781 or 82, ownership of this land was still disputed by the Cherokee. All white settlers lived under constant threat of attack. In fact, during the years 1780-90 and into the 1800's, the entire area between Guilford courthouse and the Nolochucky seethed with strife. Trory uprisings required quieting, Indians raided, and finally the British army moved in and took battle stance.

Nathan, along with his father, his brothers, his uncles, all stood steadfast, guns in hand, in defense of American independence and white ownership. His pension statement as well as other and abundant evidence shows his early conviction that the cause of the Revolution was wise and desirable. He was in sustained association with Landon Carter, the Sevier's and Shelby, but the exact nature of the relationship is not known. With them and others he patrolled the frontier and engaged in whatever fights and skirmishes developed, as shows in Pamsey's Annals, in the tale of the Battle of Boyd's Creek.

Nathan's plantation consisted of a tract granted by the state of North Carolina in 1782 to Joseph Brown, Sr., and sold by his son, Joseph Jr., to Ignatius or Nathan Gann for cash, Sept. 4, 1790 (Wash., Co. DB4, pp. 143-44; Bk. 32, p. 365). As far as we know, here Nathan remained the rest of his life. Just how the land was owned, traded amongst the family, etc., is not known, but when he died in 1839, Nathan possessed part if not all of Adam's original grant plus his own additions. And to this day the farm has more or less been in the hands of his descendants. The present owner is Mr. Lester Snapp. A great love of the earth for its own sake characterized Nathan's line, persisting long after farming ceased to pay.

The farm lies on the Nolochucky River twelve miles from Jonesboro. New Salem Church and Cemetery adjoin it on land donated out of the Gann estate. Mr. Leland T. Jordan of Lufkin, Texas, whose wife descends from Nathan, provided an air photo of the holding as it is today. Lines of very old trees, some dating back to Revolutionary War Times, outline the boundaries. Mill stones equally as old line the edge of the river. The church and cemetery lie southeast of the site of the original homestead, while the modern home of the present owner sits next to the place where Nathan's house stood.

His Government Marker: Along with his wives, Nathan was buried on his farm, common custom then, but the exact spots have been lost. Field boundaries and roadways have undergone change. Now, a short distance from the house, a U. S. Government Marker attesting Nathan's Revolutionary War service, sits within a fenced lane and

is plainly visible from a modern road. It is the standard marker, specifying service in the Tennessee militia under Captain Milliken, plus the date of Nathan's death, 7-18-1839. In 1966 Mrs. McCown, local historian, wrote, "I personally set up a government marker to him on the Snapp farm on the Nolochucky River, in Washington County, some time in the 1930's. His name as a soldier of the Revolutionary War had been given to me by Prof. I. F. Anderson, who died in 1928. His son, Reuben Gann, served in the War of 1812, and it was those veterans I was seeking when I found Nathan"

Testimonials: In Jonesboro, Tenn., folklorists repeat the story that Nathan Gann fired the shot that killed the British General, Patrick Ferguson, at the Battle of King's Mountain. This account comes through Mrs. McCown, Seven or eight Tennessee men stood behind a group of enemy wagons when Ferguson rode into sight. John Sevier said, "Shoot that man," and Ferguson fell from his mount.

"Whose bulle?" Sevier asked.

"Sir," said Gann, "I felled him."

"And," Sevier said, "I believed him because I have seen him stand in a canoe and shoot the eye of a fish. He was a most excellent shot."

The following excerpt comes from a letter written 7-5-1967 by Mrs. McCown to Mrs. Jessie Jordan of Lufkin, Texas: " Today while cleaning out some stacked records, I found my notes from old Mr. J. Fain Anderson of Washington College. He died in 1929, and these papers have been lost for several years. Here is what I took down when Mr. Anderson talked to me ...

'This cemetery (New Salem) came off Nathan's farm ... where he lived before 1780. He was the man who said he shot Callient Patrick Ferguson. In a field about half a mile from the church is buried Nathaniel Gann, with his wife; ... in the center of the field they were then and on into 1860. The graves were beautifully enclosed in a walnut frame with unlettered rocks. Mrs. David Good, buried in the cemetery in March, 1850, was Nathan's daughter ... Captain James Good was in Pitt's Regiment, Confederate Tennessee Army. He was a grandson of Nathaniel Gann, who was buried in his own field ...'

"This," says Mrs. McCown, "May be somewhat rambling, but Mr. Anderson's knowledge was wonderful. He had lived and taught at Washington College since 1867 and knew the history of the area."

All above except Isaac Reuben, Anne and Rebecca likely were alive in 1848. It is thought that there were others, mainly sons. Claims regarding possible sons named Daniel and Joshua are under study.

When Ignatus Nathan Gann died interstate in Washington Co., Tenn. in 1839, he left an estate to be divided between some eighteen heirs and his widow, Sarah Delaney Gann (see Washington Co. settlement of estates, vol. O.P. 3, Nov., 1841). John Hunter was appointed guardian of the minors, viz., Margaret, Malinda, James M. and Sarah S. all these four having been born after Dec. 1817, and being the children of his third wife. For proof that Ignatus and Nathan Gann were the same man, see Washington Co. Deeds, vol. 4, p. 143, Sept. 1790; and vol. 32, pp. 365-66, Mar. 1851.

"Some Went To Texas:" On 12-5-1913, Sam Houston Gann I, of Ft. Worth, Texas, set forth in an attested statement at the national headquarters of the D. A. R., details of the lineage of his father, Nathan Wilson Gann of Angelina County, Texas, whose father was William Gann, a Texas pioneer from Tennessee. This William Gann's father was Nathan Gann. Revolutionary War soldier who died in Washington County, Tennessee.

Nathan Wilson Gann, he declared, was born in Tennessee, probably Cocke Co. His father's name was William, and the wife of William before her marriage was a Delaney. These two came to Angelina County in 1836. William Gann was buried at Crockett, Texas.

"My great grandfather," continued Sam H. Gann, "was married three times and is said to have reared some seventeen or eighteen sons, many of whom left Tennessee about 1836 or 1837. Some went to Missouri, some to Arkansas, and some went to Texas, Uncle Soloman and Uncle Sampson being two of the latter. Sampson Gann went to Comanche County. Uncle George Massingill married my father's sister and they lived in Angelina County. Soloman Gann was alive in Cherokee County, Texas, in 1855.

"Grandfather Gann (William) had five boys and three girls that I know of. The boys were John Delaney, Nathan W., William Jackson, Wesley, and George W. The girls were Louisa, who married Bronson; Sarah, who married Harrison Cocker and lived near San Antonio, and Ruth, who married Elisha Evans. They lived in Angelina County.

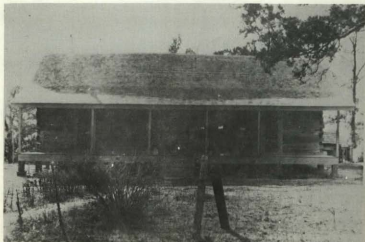
Other Achievers: Among many Gann family members who have made notable achievements are: Mrs. Jessie Wright Jordan of Lufkin, Texas, who assisted her husband, Leland T. Jordan, who was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II for developing Kuwait Oil Field; the Hon. Edward Everett Gann, born 1880, special assistant to U. S. Attorney General, 1914-21, husband of "Dolly;" Mr. Woody Gann, president of Woody's Toys, Inc., of Lufkin, Texas; Dr. George Willard Gann of Dubois, Pa., b. 1868; Ernest Kellogg Gann, Aviator-Novelist; Mr. Judge Gambill, Atty., of Ft. Worth, Texas; Mr. Robert Gann Harless, Atty., of San Francisco, California.

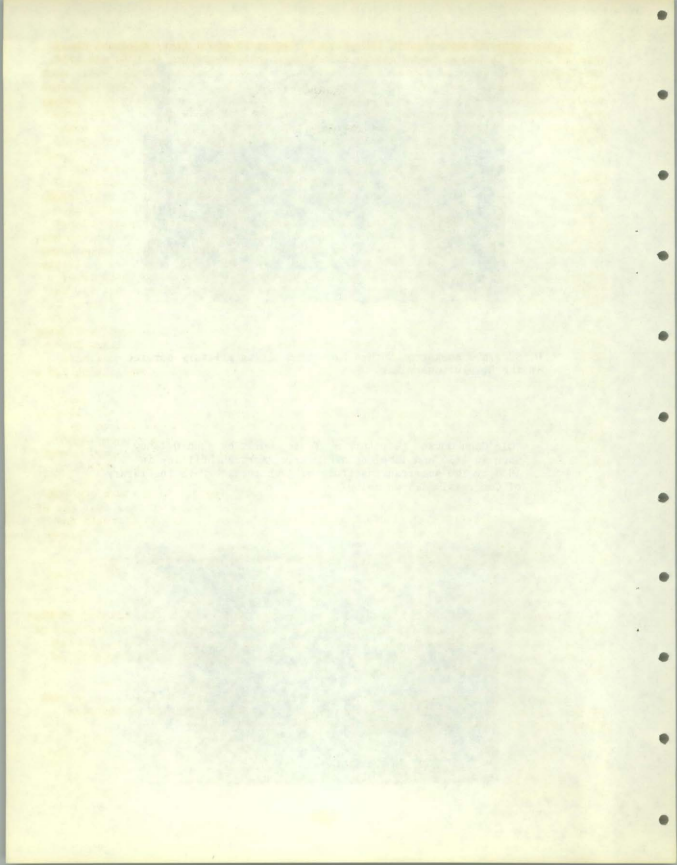

Background: Strassburger's Pennsylvania German Pioneers lists five men named Gann as coming in two separate groups from Alsace to Philadelphia in 1750 and 1752. The lengthy ship lists of German names originally showed numerous similar ones, such as Gans, Ganz, etc., but when the final entries were made, only these five instances of Gann remained: aboard the ship "Nancy" on August 31, 1750, were Fridrich, Thomas, and Johannes Gann from Loraine; while on the "Barclay" on September 14, 1754, were Christopher and Caspar Gann. Women and children were aboard but not listed. Adam Gann, could have been there, a tenn-aged boy, not listed by name on the ship list.

All evidence indicates a continental background for Gann's of Carolina and Tennessee. North Carolina is one of the few states that have deposited original county documents in state archives. Recently there was found an estate settlement or inventory for a John Gann who died in Stokes Co. in 1818. The orthography and penmanship are an eighteenth century German variety of the English language almost beyond the readability of non-experts. This John Gann is the one of the Halifax Co., Va. deeds with Adam Gann in 1776-77. The English used is that of a first generation to do so. However, the will mentions books and desks, as though some sort of little school might have been held. In his pension application, Thomas Gann, brother of Nathan, says the record of his birth was in a volume of Cato's letters that was in the house of his brother (Nathan) in Washington Co., Tenn.

Immediately upon arrival in America one or more of the five Gann immigrants went to the Upper Saucon Township settlement in Lehigh County, Penn. Sparse items in Pennsylvania and northern Virginia indicate that one or more of the men must have moved south across the Potomac and into the Shenandoah Valley very soon, living for a period near Winchester, Va., and then drifting into southwest Virginia.

In the Pennsylvania Magazine of History and Biography, vol. 35, pp. 188, 194,.... 1911, "Records of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Congregation, Upper Saucon Twp., Lehigh Co., 1750-64," we read: "7-21-1751, died Regina, wife of Johann Gann, aged 39 years, 5 weeks, 6 days, buried July 22; 9-18-1751, married Johann Gann and Elizabeth Marsteller; 11-12-1752, married Jacob Baum and Elizabeth Gann, widow.

We have no way of knowing whether Elizabeth, widow, was the same woman who had married John Gann, Widower, the previous year. But these records do show that one of the 1750 Gann immigrants was of middle age, accompanied to America by his wife and could have been the father of Adam Gann.

BOWEN FAMILY OF DALLAS

On Sunday, January 23, 1972, the Dallas Morning News carried the obituary of Miss Lucy May Bowen, age 76, great-great-granddaughter of Ahab Bowen, an early resident of Dallas. Following services Monday at North Park United Presbyterian Church, burial for Miss Bowen took place at Greenwood Cemetery (near William B. Travis School) on land that was originally part of Ahab Bowen's farm.

Bowen was an early Dallas Merchant whose business was said to have been on part of what is now the old Dallas Courthouse Square. He opened a general merchandise store there and lived on the Trinity River high ground.

For Whom Was The City of Dallas Really Named?

HOW THE "SETTLEMENT IN THE CROSS TIMBERS" BECAME DALLAS

Editor's Note:

Margaret Beeman who died in Dallas, Texas on September 6, 1919, was the wife of John Neely Bryan, City of Dallas founder, who never dreamed a controversy would later arise over his statement that he named his town "for my friend, Dallas." Apparently no record remains of anyone questioning Bryan or his widow about the identity of his "friend, Dallas." But as Frank X. Tolbert recently commented¹, in agreement with many hisotrians, this "friend, Dallas" is generally, although probably erroneously assumed to be George Mifflin Dallas, Vice-President of the United States, 1841-46. He was even honored in 1950 by an historical marker placed on the lawn of the old red court house in downtown Dallas.

Particularly vehement in this belief that the wrong Mr. Dallas is being honored is the author of the following enlightening article in which she reveals the Beeman family version of the "true story of the naming of Dallas". and "exposes" hisotrian John Henry Brown's "little joke which grew into a myth that became the hoax of the century", once it was put into the newspapers. The author praises the wisdom of the person who said, "Nothing seems more durable than an unsupported guess that gets into print and is repeated through the years. The man who said, 'Truth crushed to earth will rise again', never tried to correct a legendary error'".

When I was a child my grandmother, Sonoma Beeman Myers, lived with us. She was the daughter of William H. Beeman, eldest son of John Beeman, an early settler in Texas. Grandma Myers had a remarkable memory and a wealth of pioneer stories which not only entertained but also stimulated my early interest in local history. One day I came home from Davy Crockett School with some wonderful news - which was that our county, Dallas, was named after the vice-president of the United States! Where upon, Grandma sat me down in a chair, drew up in front and proceeded, for the first time, to give me the true facts about the naming of Dallas, city and county. She said that she hoped that I would remember these facts, and I shall, as long as I may live. This is the Beeman version of the naming of Dallas.

The Beeman family first met John Neely Bryan about 1840 in Bowie County, Texas. Bryan was passing through on one of his trips to Arkansas and Tennessee. He was in the habit of stopping enroute at a settlement in Cass County called "Bryan's Mill", established by a relative - nephew or uncle - named William O. Bryan.² Before arriving at Bryan's Mill, Bryan stopped off to pass the time of day with the Beeman brothers, John and James, recently arrived in Texas. Bryan discussed with them his plans for a trading post in the Cross Timbers, at the Three Forks of the Trinity River. He drew a map of the country for them which they would use later to scout the area. Bryan at that time had not selected a name for his proposed trading post. He soon went on his way after bidding the Beemans goodbye. They would not meet again for two years.

During those two years many changes took place. For one thing, the country was somewhat safer for the colonists since Bird's Fort had been built and established about twenty-two miles west of John Neely Bryan's camp-site. One day in January of 1842, Bryan rode over to Bird's Fort to invite the colonists to come over to his camp-site and join with him in establishing his settlement. Much to his pleasant sur-

prise he found the Beeman family living at the fort. What pleased him most was the sight of John Beeman's second daughter, sixteen-year-old Margaret Beeman, who not too much later became his bride.

The Beeman's, John S. and James J., each had land grants under The Peters Colony on White Rock Creek in what was then called Nacogdoches County but which now, of course, lies in what is called Dallas County. Their brother Samuel Beeman also had a grant, a little later...he came in 1846 with his family, from North Carolina by way of Illinois, just as his brothers had. But it was John S. and James J. who welcomed Bryan to the fort that January day and learned that he now called his little trading-post-settlement by the name of "Dallas", and that he had named it for his "friend, Dallas" (not identified) in 1840, just after meeting the Beemans two years previously.

Now there were no Dallas family land grants under the Peters Colony. But there were several families of Dallases in Texas. Brothers James R., Walter R. and Alexander Jones served in the Army of the Republic of Texas. James Dallas and family lived in Bell County, Texas. In 1843, a Joseph Dallas came to Cedar Springs from Arkansas, possibly at Bryan's request, although it would be pure conjecture to state that Dallas was named for him. Most historians (who do not follow the George Mifflin Dallas Theory) believe that James, James R. or Alexander Dallas are the more likely candidates. (They were said to be cousins of the Vice-President.) These same historians would doubtless agree that John Neely Bryan never met the Vice-President and in any case would not have called him his "friend, Dallas".

But to continue with our story, the settlement of Dallas a reality, the men of the district around the settlement chose John Beeman, now father-in-law of John Neely Bryan, as their first representative to the first legislature after their annexation to the United States. They sent Beeman off to Austin with the petition for the creation of their County, however, the legislature refused to seat him because there was no such county as he was there to represent. At that time the settlement was still part of old Nacogdoches and Robertson Counties. Beeman found himself treated as an imposter!

Fortunately, he was soon befriended by the representative from Robertson County, Dr. Wilds K. Cooke. But finding there was little a "man without a county" could do, John Beeman went home in disgust. In due course, though, after the Legislative session was over, Dr. Cooke presented John Beeman's petition for the creation of the new county. The name selected was "Polk" but that name had already been given to another new county, in southeast Texas. As John Beeman was from the settlement of Dallas, that name was hurriedly substituted and passed without comment.

After the Legislature adjournment, John Beeman, in ill health himself, sent his son, William H. Beeman, on a trip to Franklin, the county seat of Robertson County, to pick up a copy of the Statute of Authorization from Dr. Cooke, as proof that the Legislature had authorized the creation of Dallas County on March 30, 1846.

The son, William, went alone, riding a fleet Mustang pony. He slept out on the bald prairie one night going and coming, and later, acknowledged that it was a scary experience (the open country he went through was not exactly the safest place in the world to be in those times!). But he made the journey safely and successfully.

The father, John Beeman, after his part in the creation and recognition of Dallas County, wanted no further part of politics, nor did his son William. John died March 12, 1856, only 56 years old. William H. died January 14, 1905, of pneumonia.

So seeing that the City of Dallas was named in 1840 and the county in 1846 (for the city and "friend, Dallas"), old settlers were puzzled over something they began hearing repeated...that Dallas was named for the vice-president of the United States ...the popular saying became one still repeated today - :we couldn't get the president so we took his vice-president." Where did such a myth originate? At first the old settlers who knew the true story of the naming, ignored the new "myth", however, as it persisted, they were annoyed and tried to ferret out its source.

They came to believe the error was given birth in John Henry Brown's History Of Dallas County, Texas, From 1837 - 1887, many of the errors of which were corrected by John H. Cochran's Dallas County; A Record Of Its Pioneers and Progress, published in 1928. The Beeman family excused the error in the naming of Dallas with a shrug of their shoulders and said since Mr. Brown had not been back there in 1846 and since he had never troubled to ask any of the Beemans about early Dallas and their close association with the city, the county and with John Neely Bryan himself, his information could not be considered reliable and was to be ignored.

But something happened to compound the injury. On October 1, 1885, George Bannerman Dealey had come to Dallas from Galveston and established the "Dallas Morning News". He knew Mr. Brown, listened to his story, found it feasible and went all out to help publicize it. He bought a large portrait of George Mifflin Dallas and hung it in the lobby of the News Building for all to see. The autographed portrait hangs on the fourth floor wall today.

From time to time, the newspaper interviewed the old settlers and printed their accounts and tales. On Sunday, January 26, 1902, they published an interview with Mr. and Mrs. William H. Beeman (William who had ridden the Mustang pony) and the account was well written and interesting. But lo and behold, there stuck right in the middle of the article, like a sore thumb, is "the myth"...exactly what William Beeman did not say, but which, much to his horror and disgust, was quoted as coming from his mouth. Try as he might, indignant as he was, he could not scotch the misquote, and the "myth" gained further esteem, unmerited. The same mistake was repeated again and again and the "myth" became "the established fact."

Does anyone know the protocol of giving back an unmerited historical marker?

APPENDIX:

SOME BEEMAN FAMILY NOTES

Included in the family of Samuel Beeman (see first page of foregoing article)

was his son-in-law, William Hunnicutt, who was a brother of Mrs. John Beeman. James J. Beeman's cousin, Hamp Rattan (see Stambaugh's History of Collin County, Texas) was killed by the Indians while the Beeman's were at Bird's Fort.

To mark the difference in the families, the sons and some daughters, were given their mother's maiden name, thus, John's sons were Wm. H., Samule H., Isaac H., James H., and John Scott W. and Samuel's sons were John S., Isaac, Peter C. S., Wm. W. and Jacob S. (these later two sons were killed in the Civil War by snipers bullets as they marched in formation).

James J. had two sons, France M. and Charles A. Beeman. The nephew, John S. Beeman with his wife and infant son, Alexander Beeman, came to Texas with his uncles. There were other children born in Texas.

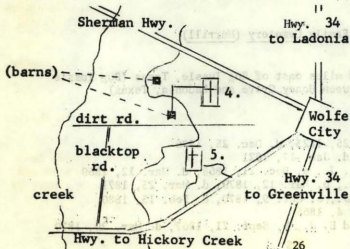

TEXAS SCHOOL BOOK DEPOSITORY BUILDING, DALLAS, TEXAS

Proposed John F. Kennedy Memorial Center Museum

By Aubrey Mayhew

(Note: Mr. Mayhew purchased at auction the Texas School Book Depository Building, widely publicized in connection with the assassination of President Kennedy. Speaking to the Dallas Local History and Genealogical Society at the January meeting, Mr. Mayhew told the story of the purchase, and outlined his plan to use the building as a museum-depository for his private collection of Kennedy family memorabilia, a collection he says exceeds 200,000 individual items, "the most thorough and important accumulation of information on John F. Kennedy in the world. "He also told of some local opposition to his proposal because of painful memories associated with the building. He likened the Texas School Book Depository Building and President Kennedy to the Ford Theater and President Lincoln, both tragedies a part of history regardless of painful memories. Mr. Mayhew hopes to find financial support in order to carry out his plan which is outlined below in his words. Editor)

1. The John F. Kennedy Memorial Center plans to be a complex of knowledge, art and information relating to the life of John F. Kennedy. Exhibits will be a major aspect of the Center's activities. In addition, scholarly research and educational programs will be pursued. There will be: a library and study rooms that visitors may use; world contact to gather new information and exhibit material; a publication program to inform the public; service to exchange research data with other institutions and educational organizations.
2. The institution will be controlled by a board of directors composed of persons locally in Dallas and nationally. An honorary board of advisors will exist, utilizing the talents and knowledge of nationally prominent men including the President of the United States. Mr. Mayhew will act as the administrative head of the institution.
3. First Floor: Exhibits of size will be housed in this area and will include a P. T. Boat directly connected with President Kennedy's naval career. The Kennedys personal car used in 1960. A restaurant and a historical gift shop will be available for visitor's convenience.
4. Second Floor: Offices of Administration, the Director's Office, and the research department. Not open to the public. Visitors will be received on official business only.
5. Third Floor: Archive, information center, microfilm library and research center. The publications office and study hall will be available to qualified students, scholars and historians.
6. Fourth Floor: The library and additional study hall will be available to the public.
7. Fifth Floor: Exhibits on the life and administration of President Kennedy including letters, documents, sculpture, art, film, photographs, books, philatelic and medallic art. Displayed in chronological order so that a visitor may become a part of the exhibit.

8. Sixth Floor: The now infamous "Sixth floor" will be preserved intact. Exhibits on this floor will relate to the assassination only and will be set aside from the area of the window. This will be a factual and historical exhibit and will in no way enhance the tragedy.

9. Seventh Floor: Exhibits will include the history of the Kennedys, all members of the family, past, present and future, their lives, their work and their relationship to President Kennedy. Included will be information on all persons directly related to the Kennedys, socially and in business and politics.

10. Research and Study: There will be a continual search for information, letters and documents, which will be assembled and cataloged on microfilm to be used in the historical study of John F. Kennedy and made available to students, scholars and historians.

11. Museum: The acquisition, preservation and display of memorabilia will be a major project and a continuing one.

12. Library: The library will contain every book written by a Kennedy, about a Kennedy, or one making reference to the Kennedys. Books written by persons associated with the Kennedys, historical and political literature relating to President Kennedy's administration will also be represented.

13. Publication: The Center will issue regular publications in the form of newsletters, pamphlets and books. Progress reports, financial reports, new finds, administration, and general information will be the nature of the publications.

14. Archive: Research and preservation is a prime concern of any museum. The archive will house all items of historical and monetary value to be researched or difficult to display.

15. Lectures and Teaching: The Center will sponsor lectures and speakers both in the Center and on tour. The Center will entertain a regular program of visiting speakers, as well as furnish staff speakers to educational and civic organizations.

16. Scholarship Fund: Initially two scholarships will be established in the names of John F. and Robert F. Kennedy. These scholarships will provide a complete college or university education to selected persons who would not ordinarily have an opportunity.

17. Fund Raising: The John F. Kennedy Memorial Center would be a national, educational, non-profit institution to be developed, preserved and perpetuated on the highest plane of dignity and standard. The Center will maintain an active fund raising office with regular programs for this purpose.

 "Medical Advice"

A Sore Mouth - Mix together honey and white borax, equal parts, and with a linen rag tied to the end of a skewer, rub the mouth well 3 or 4 times a day.
 A Sore Throat - Take twenty drops of spirits of Turpentine on loaf sugar every night till cured, or the remedies advised for a quinsy; black currant jelly hastens the cure.
