only dedicated genealogists would thoroughly understand the joy of searching these cemeteries and reading inscriptions left by loved ones of long age. Genealogists would also understand the value of the information contained on these tombstones, information which might well be lost to descendents if we did not search those cemeteries and record the information before time or vandals obliterated inscriptions.

I am well pleased to see the increasing interest in genealogy in our community. I am also well pleased that we have dedicated members who have donated their time and talents to teach those who wish to learn about genealogical research.

Your nominating committee this year outdid themselves in providing us with the finest slate of officers our Society could ask to have. #### PAST PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

The Annual Report of the President, according to the Bylaws, is printed in the September issue of the Quarterly. This summary of DGS accomplishments in 1978-79 is submitted with pride. 1. The national speakers for our Annual Workshop drew an attendance which resulted in the best ending

profit picture of any previous administration -- \$1,900.

2. From those funds, a donation to the Ballar Public Library Genealogy Dept. of \$500.00 was made. As of June 30, 1979 the cash on hand was \$3,950.70. Adding to that the \$1,000 CD for life members and accounts receivable of approximately \$50.00, the year-end balance is over \$5,000 left for the next administration. 3. The DGS membership at the end of June stood at 538 which is the largest in the history of the DGS. If the rate of growth continues at the present rate, DGS probably will come close to 600 by the years's end. 4. Regular meetings have been well attended as a result primarily of the excellent speakers scheduled.

Only 2 meetings fell below 100 -- October and February, day meetings at the Library. At the March meeting at the church, there were more than 200 people present, also a record for DGS.

5. The selection of the University Park United Methodist Church as a new meeting place ended a long-

term search. A goal of several past administrations, much effort was expended in the search of a facility. The publicity this year has been superb. News releases were prepared and submitted at the proper time for each of our regular meetings to about 70 area newspapers, radio stations and libraries. In addition, approximately 175 news releases were distributed around the state on the DGS Annual Workshop. 7. DGS honored eight of its members who passed away during the year with memorials to the Genealogy

Department of DPL: Juseph P. Latimer, past president; Ray Larner; Olive Black; Mrs. David Richardson; J. O.

Neely; Glen C. Haskins; Col. Lloyd R. Garrison; Mrs. William Crawford.

8. A new feature provided by DGS for new as well as experienced genealogists was the Beginner's Session. Held prior to the regular meetings, the continually increasing attendance indicated the need for

such classes.

9. Both DGS publications were enlarged this year. The 10 issues of the Newsletter contained material of a genealogical nature including information received by DGS from other societies, book publishers, etc., which might not have been available to our readers otherwise. The June issue was mailed to a total of 715 people. The Quarterly increased to 248 pages of published research material this year with the June cir-culation figure of 396 which included 67 exchanges. Keeping the three mailing lists up to date was one of the president's responsibilities, but during 1979-80 will be handled by a Board member. 10. More than 20 books were donated to the Genealogy Department during the year, some as memorials and

others as review copies for the Quarterly.

11. We continued collecting pedigree charts to be included in Vol. 2 of the DGS Ancestors book. Copying of the Dallas County Marriage Records has also continued for publication in the Quarterly and ultimately as Vol. 2 of DGS Marriages.

13. A project completed this year, but which had been underway for several years, was that of the Family History Index put together by Bill Crawford and his committee which were listed in the June 1979

Quarterly. This project gives researchers an every-name index of some 566 family histories housed in the

Genealogy Department of the Dallas Public Library, 14. One of the new projects infitted during 1978-79 was a County-wide Inventory and Index of Come-teries which will eventually be published by DGS. Some 129 conteries have been located with 70 completed.

15. The design and publication of the new blue DGS brockure provides the Society with a publicity piece to acquaint prospects, etc., with our Society's history as well as current activities. Brochures were

included in all outgoing correspondence of non-members including orders for books. They are also available at area libraries as well as our meetings. It has proven to be a valuable membership development tool. A sufficient quantity (5,000) were printed to take advantage of printing price break and will be used by

future administrations although it was paid for by this administration.

16. A revised edition of the Society's order form was also printed this year which includes the Quarterly inventory and costs. These also are enclosed as envelop stuffers in our mails to generate sales. An outgrowth of the microfilm project done in 1977-78 is the Every-name Index to the Probate Cases (1846-1900). The Probate Index published by DGS previously included only the name on the outside of the probate packet. This project will extract every name mentioned on the papers inside, and when completed, will add hundreds of thousands of names to the research available on Dallas County.

18. The Society made its first major equipment acquisition in September 1978 when we acquired a new IBM self-correcting selectric typewriter. Purchased for the purpose of providing those individuals working on Society projects with the proper equipment to produce quality work, the typewriter was used in 1978-79 by the editor and others working on the Quarterly. A maintenance contract is carried on the machine. 19. Another investment in 1978-79 was storage rental, necessitated by the large DGS book inventory. An inventory made jume 1979 revealed 1,355 books available for sale, which at the current prices charged, gives DGS a total of \$12,338 in book assets alone. Not included in this inventory done by the president

are the back issues of the Quarterly housed at Margaret Smith's home

20. For the research projects done in 1977-78, DGS received the first Award for Research ever presented by the Texas Heritage Council in September, and the placque is on display at the Library. 21. As a result of a letter from Northern Ireland, an Irish Research Group was formed. Three meetings

have been held and more than 75 individuals are sharing research and resources. A 14-page "Irish Research has been compiled from information provided by the participants and is now available.

22. A Special Committee on Finance appointed by the president and composed of Bill Jacoby, San Holmes, Russell Marriott, Margaret Smith, and Dee Brown Walker studied the DGS financial structure. They concluded that: a) financial reports should be divided into 3 categories (operations, external publications & workshops); b) a Bylaws revision effecting the new function of the Finance Committee; i.e., a year-round committee with supervisory power over DGS finance matters; c) composition of Finance Committee is recommended to be: Treasurer, as chairman; President, Past President, and 3 members of the Board to be chosen by the Board. 23. Membership dues were increased to \$10 for a family membership, and Patron and sustaining Member-

ships were reinstated. One Patron Membership was received in 1979. 24. This was the first year that Society Directors served with assigned responsibilities, and it has

proven very beneficial.

The year 1976-79 was a year of record breaking achievement, and even though I resigned as President at the June 18 loan's Meeting. I have a real feeding of pride for the accommissionents of the rest. DOS is now, because of its size, its annual budget, its 55 years of experience, no longer a small-time mattern organization but a duly recognized professional Society, and should recognize the impact we have on the Ballam entropolitism area as well as around the country. Therefore, we must accept and assume the contingent

As a token of my personal appreciation of the Dallas Genealogical Society and the many opportunities of service therein, I presented to the Society at the June meeting a placque listing all the Past Presidents. Good luck in this the beginning of DSS 25th anniversary year.

Unless otherwise ordered by the Board, regular meetings of the Executive Board shall be held on the Second Thursday of each month in which regular meetings of the Society are held. Special meetings of the Board can be called by the President or shall be called upon the written request of 6 members of the Board. Six members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. Section 3

The regular meetings of this Society shall be held at such time and place as may be determined by the Executive Board.

The regular meeting in June shall be known as the Annual Meeting and shall be for the purpose of electing officers, receiving reports of officers and committees, and for any other business that may arrise. Section 2

Special meetings can be called by the President or by the Executive Board, or Section 3. shall be called upon the written request of 25 members of the Society. Membershin shall be notified. Thirty members shall constitute a quorum. Section 4.

Committees

The Annual Workshop Committee shall arrange the Annual Workshop at a time and place selected by the Executive Board.
The Budget Committee shall meet after the Annual Meeting in June and prepare a

Section 2. budget for the following year. It shall submit the budget to the Board for approval and submit it to the Society at the next regular meeting. The committee shall consist of the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer and the immediate Past-President.

A financial Audit Committee of 3 members shall be appointed by the President in June. This Committee shall audit or have audited the Treasurer's account and Section 3. report at the September Meeting.

Such other committees, standing or special, shall be appointed by the President as the Society or the Executive Board shall deem necessary to carry on the work of the Society. The President shall be an ex-efficio member of all committees Section 4. except the Nominating Committee.

Article IX - Parliamentary Authority
The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall
govern the Society in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not
inconsistant with the Charter and By-Laws of the Society, and any special rules of order that the Society may adopt.

Article X - Amendments of By-Laws
These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Society by a two-thirds vote of members present provided that the proposed amendment has been submitted in writing at the previous regular meeting.

Henry Shoaf, Jr. had four sons, the last born after his death, on 10 March 1792. Henry, Jr. and Christian were sons of Henry Shoaf, Sr. (John Henry Shoaf) and his wife Ann Sprecher.

Jacob Shoaf, Jr.'s first wife was Elizabeth Berrier and his second wife was Sarah Mayab.

The Hinkel children shown in this Bible record are the children of Christian Hinkel (Henckel, Hinkle) and his wife Correnia Emiline Shoaf.

Susannah Hinkle was the daughter of Gaspar (or Casper) Hinkle. This Hinkle family has been traced back several generations into Germany and a Hinkle genealogy has been published by the Hinkle Family Assoc.

The Shoaf and Hinkle families intermarried to a great extent. Christian Hinkle (b. 13 oct. 1838) was the son of Mathias Hinkle (b. 8 June 1794) Mathias Hinkle was the brother of Susannah Hinkle. Wilksboro

June 24, 1846

Dear Father.

I believe I promised to let you know how I was getting along just so soon as I got my school properly started, and I think this will be as good a time as I can expect this session. Well I commenced my school on the first of June as was my intention when I left home. I had a safe trip to Wilkesboro, but had some differculty in getting a suitable place to hold my school, which difficulty has been somewhat met on the part of my employers and also on my own. I have at present a school worth one hundred and thirty dollars for the session, out of which I will have to pay my boarding and other expenses. I have the promise of several scholars from a distemce this session yet, but do not expect them on until the first of next month. I have been under the necessity of purchasing some books and my stage fare to this place which was four dollars instead of three and also my tavern bill at Salem and one meal on the way which things taken together have exhausted the little money I had when I left home. So you see I am again left pennyless as usual. If I had but two or three dollars it would see me safe through this session, but I have been dunning you so much, that I begin to think that you are getting tired of my calls for money. It would however, be most greatfully received if convenient on your part. I heard from D. Crooks last week and they were all stirring at that time. Write to me as soon as possible and let me know how you are all doing. I am getting into the good graces of this people, have been at one great wedding since I left home and have every reason to think that I shall do well in this place. Give my love to all at home and accept my best wishes for your own happiness while I have the honor to subscribe myself your

Dear Mr. Jacob Berrier Sr.

Dear father and mother allow me by letter to introduce Mrs. Amelia A. Berrier, formerly Gaston, we were married on the first day of July. I intended writing to you from day to day but was prevented from doing so by multiplicity of business until 25 August when I was taken sick, since which time I have been unable to write and am at this time unable to hold a pen. Mr. King, my brother in law, is writing for me. I am laboring under a severe attack of Typhoid fever and am thought by my Physician, Dr. Reeves, and friends to be in critical condition. I feel dear father and mother that if it be the will of my heavenly father to call me hence at this time that I have the assurance of my acceptance at his right hand, where are blessings forevermore. If I live I think that I will live to his honor and glory the remainder of my days. Oh how I wish to see you-all my relatives and friends. If I live I will write to you as soon as I am able, if I die you will be informed by Mr. King. Dear parents if I live I wish to forward on what I can spare out of my earnings the present year to be applied to the liquidation of my tuition debt, which as yet I have not been able to meet. But if life lasts I will be able to spare something every year until that matter is cancelled. I do not wish my friends to dispare of getting their money, nothing but death shall prevent my paying all my debts ...

Dear Sir.

In compliance with the last request of your son Andrew Berrier, I address you with these lines, to inform you that he died on last Sabbath evening - 26th instant -1/2 past 7 o'clock, he died believing that he was going to heaven, the last words to which he gave utterance, were (to me) - tell my father after I die, that I died, and that I have suffered enough to attone for all my wrongs of boyhood. He suffered severely during the whole of his protracted illness, but you may console yourself with this thought, that he had every attention during his illness, his wife and myself gave him our undivided attention the whole time. He has, though his time with us was short, left a wife and a great number of friends and relatives to mourn his loss, though we do not mourn as those who have not hope, yet we feel sorely, the loss we have sustained. His wife seems irreconcibilable. He said something about oweing a school debt, and about owing for books at two or three

places, about all of which, I wish you to give me all the information in your power to give. I will be happy to correspond with you in regard to any information which you may desire, in relation to any matter that has come under my knowledge.

Dear Mr. Jacob Berrier

Estemed friend I received your favor of the 24th of November the 5th of December which afforded great joy to us all to hear from you and that you landed your home after having a long travail. We are all well and all the relation and hope that these few lines may find you and all the friends enjoying the same like blessing.

I took your letter agreable to all the friends with the exception of Henry Sowers the reason I did not was this the weather being cold and the roads being had and I am a getting old and so I neglected it. I hope you will excuse me for procrastinating the time so long and not riting soomer as I have put off from time to time with the expectation to get to see Henry Sowers and the friends over there, they was all well the last account I had from them and that has not been long since. The health through our country jenerely is good there has been several deaths since last fall. George Leeanards wife died in the fall while he was gone to Tennessee, Andrew Sappenfield and youngest child died in December, Winkle Peter Grine died in January the last of it, Andrew Byerley (seign) wife died the fifth of April. She had the consumption.

We have had a dry winter and not mutch rain this spring, wheat crops look very promising. I will now give you the prises of produse, wheat is worth from \$1.00 to \$1.25, it is 125 in all the markets and 100 in the barn, corn is from 30 to 35, cats 30, pork is from \$450 to \$500, beef from \$500 to \$550, Horses are from \$100.00 to 125.00 per head, cattle are \$3.00 per hundred grose so no more of that.

I want you to go to the recorders office and see what kind of a right that Everhards boys have got for fathers old place and then write and let me know what kind of a right they have got. So no more of that. I would like for you to come and settle your self in our country. Tell all the friends and relations I would like for them all to pay me one viset look at our country.

Having nothing mutch of importence to write to you at this time but I want you to write as soon as this comes to hand. So no more at present. But remain your friend as ever.

Dear Nephew

I now will answer your letter that fild my hart so full I could not hold it any longer, my brother, your son, my only son that I set so much store by for to help me in my old days, all piled on me at once. I had my son Jacob to bury on the 4th of April 1857, he suffered more than I ever say any person suffer. He was sick about seven weeks, he was four days and nites that he did not sleep a wink nor ly still fifteen minutes. Some times he would be a talking and some times a crying and sometimes a whistling and then he would laugh, and so he went on for four days and nites. O it was too mutch to see how he had to suffer. He was the porest person I ever saw. I had to handle him just like a little child for nerely five weeks, he was nothing but skin and bones. We always was very healthy since we came to this country till this winter and since Christmas we have had one and sometimes two sick all the time. I was nearly three months that I did not sleep more than I got between seven and eleven o'clock in the evening and very often not ly down at all. The reason was any one could set up till eleven oclock and then they would go to nodding and that would not do with such sick people. So I just tended to them day and nite, and if ever any wun suffered in health and mind I certainly did. First Ellen was taken and then Stephen he lay a long time that I had to lift one and then the other till Steven died, then Henry was taken befor Ellen could walk a crose the floor and when Henry began to git better, Jacob was taken down then he had the longest time, then Polly was taken and she is a gitting sou now that she can walk a crose the hous without help. So you can see that I have had a time of it. I find myself intirely wore out, and not calculate to rite a letter but I thought I would rite so as to let you know how we are, it apears to me that I am delt with like JOB of old. I cannot hear of nothing but trouble and trials of every kind. But I must do like JOB did - the Lord giveth and the Lord takith away and Bles the Lord, for what he dith is well done, let it appear ever so hard with me. I must close my letter by telling you that I am in no fix to compos a letter to you of satisfaction and hoping that these lines will find you and family in a better state of health and my little family is againing in health, as I have only two children with me, that makes a small family to what I have bin used to. I want you to rite when you get this letter and still give me all the information you can, about my friends and relations, So no more BUT remains your uncle.

I lift my pen onst more to info you that we ar all well at present hoping that thes few lines may find you and family in the same helth but we hav bin sick. Robert tuck sick the last of November the horse trompt on his foot in the first plase then it hurt him so bad he sent for the doctor and he could not come but he sent word that he should put his foot in warm water. Jest as soon as he put his foot in the water he got sick and he got wors and wors till he got rite sick and we did not think he would live. Then he tuck a fever and was sick nerly all winter but he is well now but before he got well Elen Berrier tuck sick with the tiforid fever and before Elen got well Steven tuck som fevor and Jacon and they boath died and I was not well nuf to go see them. I hav not bin stout all winter you don know bad I felt. Steven died befor I was confind and Jacon rit after. I did not kno he wos so bad tel I herd he wos dead. I cod not tell you my felling. Mother is not well and tim she is able to be up yet. Father look lik as if he bin sick the rist is well. I have the finest lettle daughter you ever seen, if you dont beliv it com and see. It has bin very cold this winter her, it has bin more wet wether than iver wos noin in Iowa, and more study cold wether and being coald peple is feding there catel yet, they no thare is no grass yet. Robbert has soad his wheate but ther is a good meny has not sode yet. The old Mr. Redding was at our house last week he ses tha or all wel in Missuria when he left. He ses that Phillip and Sarah has a fin son. I must close for hav no time to rite jest now. I hav three more letters to ancer, I thought a few lines to all and let them no how we ar. Give my love to all the friends and ceape a shere you self.

Som of nabers lost nerly all thar cattle for wont of feed. We lost the last cow the other day. We only had too Milk cow. One got in the mud and other had the holer horn. We had fode but it was to wet for too seasons. Som people could not ras half nuf fead for ther stock. But we liv on roling land. But grate many have no mony to buy with and thar cattle had to starv. One more such sumer sum of people would hav to starve it has bin a open winter. If it had bin cold lik som winter the cattle would have suferd. It did not frees harde for som nabers the other day went out and dug up some potatoes that had not bin dug out of the hils yet. That something new for this cuntry, they havnt bin much snow but rain rain all the time, it has bin muddy nuf. I hop it will quit rain and let rain sum this summer. It has bin purty drying days and this is nice day but it is gitting tim now have the wheat soed. It is not dry nuf to see some roling land mite is to cole for seed. You said in father letter you wold lik to had to com and see you, we would to want to seen you all. and got peas shanghi to but we had no time the sugar can drown

out, but som of the nabers had som don fine. It don so fine som mor will try it, the molases so nice. Will must close I spose you hav all the news from this part the cuntry I to give at this tim nothing interesting to giv you. We ar all well at this tim and the friends ar all well as far as I know. I these ful lines will you family all well. Giv my love to all the couson and aunts and escept for your self a supply. Your unworthy cousts.

Davidson County, North Carolina
January 21, 1863

Dear Brother

I seat my self down to rite a few lines to you to inform you that my family is not well at this time but better my children all has had the scarlet fever and sore throats and swell tongs. They were taken the week before Christmas, they are all beter with out it is Edward and he is not much better he has ben sick over five weeks but I hope he will get better in a few days. But I hope when these few lines reach you will find you well and in good health. Dear Brother I've got nothing but trouble to rite to you but I feel it my duty to rite to you and I sorry that I must say to you that your Dear Beloved Wife Eliza is dead, she died Sundy night last 18th about midnight, she had a hard spell. She was sick some three weeks and 4 or 5 days. She sufered dredfull, she had the smallpoks, but she was geting beter of the pocks and the 12th on Monday she taken the typhoid fever very bad she was out of her head untill she died. I was over on Sundy the 11th and Father said she was beter and the doctor was there on Saturdy the 10th and he said she was beter and out of danger and he said he should only come ounce more to see her that wold be on Monday the 12th. An he come but when he come he found her worse, she had taken the fever. Doctor Smith from Tomisville, tended on her he come every other day to see her, he tended on Bob Hargrave widow at the time Eliza was taken he was there twice before the poks broke out on her, they broke out all over her but they were thicker in her face than any where else, they was one pock against another, her face was in one solid scab about 1/4 inch thick. Dear Brother I will state to you how this sad acident hapend. The time that Ms. Sick was out here her folks sent for her to come over on Sunday to see John Sinks wife that she was sick and she had nothing but the bilous fever and Eliza went and all the children and she hope John wife out of the bed and made up her bed and she had fever, but she had the small pocks at the time but had not broke out yet an that the way Eliza got them. I blame her people for all of this although if the old man had ben at home this would hav not hapend, her folks say that her little brother slipt off on Sunday morning and they did not now wher he was and he had come over to your house after Eliza. It is dreadful to think about it. I had hear that they had the smallpocks thare and at Joseph Sinks and at Old John Edingers and John wife had ben there and Eliza had herd it too. But they sending for her and saying that they hadent them is the reason she went. Brother nothing but truble your poor little children is tolerable well the baby had ben verry bad the first week that Eliza sick. I afraid it would take them; but it is rite pert, I do hope that they will not get them at all. Old Mister Sink is a going to take the children and take care of them, his folks has all got through with them purty much. They was all sick about the time

Eliza was taken the pocks. Mis Sink had the ericiplis but (B?)eter Camiline Sink is dead she died two weeks back. Dear Brother I will state to you that our poor Father is verry sick at this time and I am afraid he will not get up again but I hope and trust he will, he was taken with the ericiplas in the face on his cheek bone below his eye, his face is all sweld up and busted on his cheek. He has taken the Tiphoid Fever with it, he was brought from your house last Sunday the 18th in the warm part of the day he has ben over thare awaiting on Eliza and the children ever since she has ben sick up of a night wit the baby and given medicin that he lost a great deal of rest and taken coal. Brother he has had a hard time of it. I know there he was and wasent dast to go home nor no where els nor nobody to go there it seems hard, it makes the tears run from my eyes to think about it and now Father is at home and I not dast to go in the house to see him because he has ben over at your house. I dont go herer than the garden or smoke house, neare enough to hear from him. It is hard I do think but maby only the beter on the account of spreading the deseas inv further. Young Adam Sink moved him from your house last Sundy he stript him and left his close over there and I hope he will not get them but a body does not now. He was vacinated and it tok a good affect and all of his family, some four of my children was vacinated but only two youngest boys got sore and then they took the fever. And now I cant do nothing for them untill they get well I had it tried some three times in my arm but it woul take no effect. I wold say to yo that your children all was vacinated and got good scabs befor Liza got sick and her also but the pocks was in her before. A Mother was over with Liza when she was first taken and staid all night when she had fever but didnt (know) at that time that she was taken the pocks but it scared her very much but she keep herself close for three weeks or more. There was as much danger at Paps as they was at your house although she has not got them yet but I expect she will be laid up before many days. Father is very bad high fever and out of his head all the time mostly. Doctor Smith still ten on him. He is the small pock Doctor, there is been several deths of pocks. one of Edingers sons from the army, Squire Coonarads wife and two children and John Everharts wife at meeting house and several others, its about rite smart. I shoul hav rote ten days sooner but Father said not rite till you rote again that was when you rote your last letter that dated January 7th, I was over on Sunday and near enough to hear Father read it. Excuse me for not riting any sooner, consider it over we have had a bad time of it among us and God (knows) we may have it worse so I must bring letter to a close. Brother rite to me. You are the only brother that I got in this world. I dont now whether we will see each other in this or not. I trus to God we shall and so remaing your Brother untill death.

Camp near Charlottsville, Virginia

April 10, 1864

Dear Friend

Seat myself to inform you that I am well at this time and hope these few lines may find you and family in good health. The members of my company are generally well. We are now resting from a very long and muddy march. We left our old camp in Albemarle County on the first day of April and got to this place on the 8 day. The wether has been verry bad, it snowed or rained nearly every day during our march and yesterday and last night we had verry heavy rains. The roads are almost impassable, active operations can not begin in less time than four weeks, and not then if the wet weather continues. It is impossible to move artillery while the

mud is so deep. I would not care much if it stayed muddy all summer, as it would keep us from doing some hard fighting. It is believed by all our Generals that we will have some of the hardest fighting to do this summer that has ever been done. Old N. E. Lee says he can whip the whole Yankee Nation if they will attack him in his fortifications. I think that he intends acting entirely on the defensive this campaign. I think that he has found out that going to Pennsylvania is like the Negro position - It costs more than it comes to. The Yankee Pickets tell us they are going home as soon as their times are out and they never expect to fight us again. They say we may go to hell with our Confederacy. I talked with some Yankee pickets near Hameltons Crossing. They say they are going to elect a new president in the United States and it would be a man opposed to the war. They said they would vote for no man who was not in favor of stopping the war. I do not think myself the war will last longer than this year.

I have nothing of importance to wright to you at present, so I will close for this time, by asking you to wright as soon as this comes to hand and give me all the news. Have you planted any corn, how does the wheat and oats look? Wheat in this country looks very qood.

#### GRIMES LETTERS

Camp Gaines Mill near Richmond, Virginia

July 4, 1862

Dear Brother-in-law

Your favor of the 15th of June was received in due time and read with interest, though I am sorry to hear that you have had so much sickness among you. Your letter would have been answered sooner had we not been having such stirring times here since the 2 th. It would be useless for me to give a discription of the battle which has been going on in this vicinity since that time, as I know you have it from the papers much more accurate than I could give it. The slaughter on both sides has been awful, but my opinion is that the enemy has the most slain. Our regiment was not engaged at all from the fact that the nature of the battle ground and the enemys works would not admit of Cavalry manuevers. To see the positions which each force occupied it does not seem possible for our forces to have gained so signal a victory. Surely the hand of Providence was engaged on our side. Their defenses seem to have been well chosen and of the strongest kind. Had their forces been the attacking party and ours as well prepared as theirs were, I do not think they could have driven us from the position. From the appearances of the deserted camps it seems that McClelland's forces were very numerous. The whole country round is one vast camping ground. His force must certainly have been superior to Lee's. The battlefield was a sight which I never wish to see again, though it may be my fortune to witness worse, if such can be. The second day after the fight I was on a portion of the battlefield and the spectacle presented was awful beyond discription. The dead, principally of the enemy, had not been buried and the bodies swolen to twice the ordinary size of a man, were in a state of putrification. The most of them had turned perfectly black and the stench was intolerable. I found it impossible to keep from sickning, until I managed as much as possible to prevent the inhalation of the tainted atmosphere. The dead could not be buried (that is, all of them) but were merely covered with dirt where they lay. Since the rain has fallen. I learn that many have washed out and lie exposed. The air everywhere through here is very unwholesome from the dead men and horses scattered around. I hope we will not have to stay here much longer.

The whole country through here is laid waste for miles around, crops entirely destroyed and scarcely a westage of fence remains. The Northern Army accomplished all of this distruction before our men passed through here. The plunder left behind when they retreated was immense besides the great quantity of more valuable articles which they burnt. The fields were strewn with arms and equipage of every kind, clothing of every discription, even ladies apparel I have seen laying on the fields and through the woods. As to McClelland's forces now, I know but little. I learned today, that had escaped to his gumboats with all but about fifteen thousand, who were surrounded by our men and would be taken. For the truth of this report, I can not vouch.

The day your letter came to hand, Jackson went to Richmond to see Henry, but he had moved a day or two before to Danville and consequently he did not find him. I

would have been very glad to see him, but we did not find out where he was until the day before Jackson went to see him. I have not heard from him but once since we left home. Would write to him but do not know where to direct a letter so that he would be sure to get it. I hope however to hear that he is getting well, or is well, whenever I do get news from him. I will try and send this by some person from Lexington, as I learn that there are several in Richmond from there. Let me hear from you again soon. Address me at Richmond, care Captain Clement, 10th Regiment Virginia Cavalry.

Camp Hanover Court House, Virginia

August 20th 1862

Dear Brother,

Your favor of the 11 last has been received and read with pleasure. I was glad to learn that you are all well. Since L. L. Conrad has been taken away I know that you must have a great deal of work that should be done, that it is impossible for you to do yourself, and about the next news I expect to hear from you, will be that you are sick, brought about by your trying to do more than nature intended you should do.

Since I wrote to you last, as you will see by caption, we have again moved our camp. We came up here on last Thursday. We are encamped in a field near the Virginia Central Rail Road. How long we will remain here I am unable to say, but I do not think it will be long. It is my opinion that we will again be ordered below Richmond, or over in Western Virginia to old Stonewall. From 3,000 to 6,000 troops have passed here daily on the cars for Jacksons army. Think Jackson and Pope will have a big fight in the valley shortly. There are scores of Marylanders coming over into Virginia and joining our army, to avoid old Abe's draft. A great many came by our camp the other evening. If the North suceeds in raising 600,000 more men, which she certainly can do, we will have a high time of it this fall. I am afraid that this war will last until famine closes it. Foreign intervention we need not expect. We have got our own Salvation to work out. The worst time, I am afraid is not yet. It appears that the North is determined to subjungate the South if it wins (which it will do) than to do it. It is said here that Jackson is going over into Maryland if he suceeds in meeting Pope. When General Stuart left here a great many of his men were barefooted, heard some of them complaining about shoes, he told them to be easy a few days for they would be in Baltimore and then they should all have a good pair. May it be as he said.

The day after Squire Conrad left our camp our company got into a fight with the Yankees. Our Company and Captain Caskies, only fifty men in all, while on picket, were attacked by about five regiments of Yankee Cavalry. There were a good many shots fired on both sides, none of our boys were hurt, but think some of the Yankees were either killed or badly wounded. Some of our boys say that Fate Conrad shot one off his horse. Fate says he fired at him and at the same time his horse made a plunge and he could not see whether he hit him or not. The Yankees surprised our boys and got a few staps of them before they knew they were even about. The

Yankees and our men got so mixed up together that a good many did not fire through fear of hitting their own men. I regret to say that in the mele they took six of our boys prisoners and eight horses, though I think they will be exchanged in a few weeks. Frank Younts was the only one from Davidson taken. They came very near getting brother Tom. There was awful scampering. It is a great wonder that the last one of them was not taken. I was very unwell that day and left the picket about fifteen minutes before the Yankees came. I had not got quite to our camp when I heard their guns. I hollered to the boys to mount their horses, that were left at the camp, for the Yankees were coming, which the whole regiment did, and formed a line of battle about half a mile further down, across the road that we expected the Yankees to come up, and then waited for them to come up, but they did not cross the swamp, but soon went the other way. The next day we took seven Yankee prisoners. Our pickets took another prisoner yesterday.

You did perfectly right in agreeing to receive the money on the note I hold against H. L. Conrad and you may also receive the money due on the church note (only half of which is mine, the other half is Henrys, as he is there you may keep it or give it to him) and on all other notes that any one may wish to pay. As money is very pleanty now I wish you would dun all those fellows that owe me and perhaps they would pay up. All the money that you may receive belonging to me, after paying my tax, keep and let me know, and I will tell you what to do with it. I want to pay every account I owe as soon as I can, so collect all the money you can for me. As soon as I draw my pay again I will send you some more money. Did old Mr. Sink receive that money I sent you for him willingly? I want the balance of that \$200.00 to J. Sink paid as soon as I can. Every thing is so high here that it takes nearly all my pay to board me. I may have another horse to buy too, for the one I have is getting very poor and may die. There is a great deal of sickness in our Company and there has been three deaths since I last wrote to you. One from Davidson, John W. Waggoner's, widow's son. Brother Tom is sick now and I am afraid he is taking the fever. If you think you can not fatten my ox, sell him to Henderson for what you think he is worth. You know how things are selling there, I do not. Any trade you make will be right with me, for I know you will do the best you can. Will Linsay be kept in the army or sent home? I have not heard anything from him since he left. Where is Henry? Is he at home in Lincoln? I wish I were in Davidson a while now, to get something good to eat. Here I eat that I may live, if there I would live that I might eat. How many good apples, peaches, green corn, watermellons are there? Oh, it will not do to think about such things here. Give my love to all and write soon. Direct your letters to me at Richmond care of Captain W. B. Clement Company B 10th Regiment Cavalry.

## WILL OF THOMAS H. HUTCHISON - MACON COUNTY, TENNESSEE

Submitted by Mrs. Norma Cansler

Many of the records of Macon County, Tennessee, were destroyed in a fire around 1900-01. The recorded will of Thomas H. Hutchison of Macon County (written 7-26-1858, probated Oct. 1862) was destroyed in that fire, but a certified copy prepared in 1881 was preserved in the family and has been recently rerecorded.

Monday 6th Oct. 1862

State of Tennessee - Macon County - County Court for the said County. October term of said Court, Anadomini 1862.

Be it remembered that a county court began and held for the County of Macon and state aforesaid at the Court Room in the Town of Lafayette on the first Monday in October, it being the 6th day of said month in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two. Present the worshipful Haley S. Young, Chairman presiding, and the following named as acting Justices of the Peace within and for said county, to wit. J. C. Marshall, W. B. Morrison, Anderson Bratton, Jonn Blankenship, Jr., S. A. King, Samuel Pipkin, Daniel Goad, John Blankenship, Sr., John Tuck and L. B. Griffith. Proclamation being made by the sheriff, Court was duly opened when the following proceedings was duly had &c.

A paper writing purporting to be the last will and testament of Thomas Hutchison dated 26th day of July 1858 and an appendix thereto dated the 15th day of June 1862 and signed by Thomas Hutchison was this day produced in open court by Elizabeth Hutchison, widow of said Thomas Hutchison, and offered for probate. And thereupon came into open court W. B. Moren and Alexander Temple the Subscribing Witnesses to said will & appendix who after first being duly sworn depose and say that they were personally acquainted with Thomas Hutchison in his lifetime, that on the 26th day of July he signed his name to the will dated on that day, and stated that it was his last will and testament and requested each of them to & they did at his request and in his presence & in the presence of each other subscribe their names as witnesses to the same, and on the 15th day of June 1862, said Thomas Hutchison in their presence signed his name, or made his mark, to the appendix attached to said will, and stated that the same was an appendix to his last will & testament and requested them to and they did at his request subscribe their names as witnesses to said appendix in the presence of said Thomas Hutchison & in the presence of each other. They further state that at the time he signed his name to the will & appendix and requested them to witness the same, he the said Thomas Hutchison was of sound mind and disposing memory, that said Thomas Hutchison departed this life in Macon County, Tennessee about the 1862. And thereupon it was ordered by the court that said will & appendix be admitted to probation and that the same be recorded, which is as follows.

to wit

I, Thomas Hutchison, do make and publish this as my last will and testament hereby revoking and making void all other wills by me at any time made.

1st I direct that my funeral expenses and all my debts be paid as soon after my death as possible out of any monies I may be possessed of, or may first come to the hands of my executor.

2nd I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth Hutchison all of my real estate and all of my personal estate of every description whatever, my real estate amounting to about two hundred acres of land. I give and bequeath all of the same to her during her natural life or during her widowhood.

3rd At the death or marriage of my wife Elizabeth Hutchison I then desire and direct that the following disposition be made of both my personal and real estate, to wit. That after the payments of the hereafter named specific legacies that an equal division of both real and personal estate be made among the following named, to wit: my daughter Peggy Hutchison, my daughter Elizabeth Hutchison and my son William Campbell Hutchison, after the payments of the following specific legacies, to wit: One hundred dollars of my estate to be paid my son William Campbell Hutchison over and above his equal share for the purpose of aiding him in procuring an education, and one dollar of my estate to my grandson Samuel Thomas Hutchison, one dollar of my estate to my grandson Samuel Thomas Hutchison, and to my granddoughter, name not known, but who is the infant child left by my son Andrew Hutchison at his death (posthumous) one dollar of my estate to her.

4th And lastly I do hereby nominate and appoint Elijah Price my executor.

In witness whereof I do to this my will set my hand and seal this 26th day of July A. D. 1858.

THEY WENT WEST, by Josephine Berry & Veda Magee, published in 1979 by S. J. T. Printing Co., Saint Jo, Texas. The book is hard cover, 6" x 9", 192 pages, unindexed. The authors collaborated on BERRY PICKIN' and compiled BERRY PICKIN' LABUM. This book is illustrated with over three dozen pictures. The book follows the descendants of Joseph & Enos McCracken who came west with their families from North Carolina in 1860. It is an interesting and well written book whether you have a McCracken ancestor or not, because it tells of a way of life that many of our own ancestors lived. There are many early Texas people mentioned. One very different section in this book gives old family recipes, and another has some old family letters. Other family names are Hoffman, Palmer, Robeson, Loring, Griggs, Morris, Berry, etc.

You may order from the author: Jeanette Bland, 1436 North Cheyenne, Richardson, Texas 75080. This is a book that has been needed for this area for a long time. Every effort has been made to make sure the names are spelled correctly by checking several other sources, i.e., books on Collin County. The number of the household is given, along with names of everyone in the household, age, sex, occupation, value of real estate, place of birth, whether married within year, whether they attend school, indicates if person is over 20 and can't read or write. Anyone doing research in this area will wont a copy. The 1860 Census including slave population & mortality schedule will be ready in early 1880.
