Lloyd de Witt Bockstruck (1945-2018) was a distinguished genealogical scholar, librarian, writer, educator, and lecturer. He was Supervisor of the Genealogy Section of the Dallas Public Library for 30 years (1979-2009). During his career, Lloyd lectured throughout the country at genealogical society workshops, seminars, and conferences.



Lloyd donated his papers to the Dallas Genealogical Society in 2018. The collection, the Lloyd deWitt Bockstruck Papers, will be housed in the Dallas Public Library. The Society has digitized several bibliographies from his lectures and made them publicly available. You can find the "<u>Bockstruck Bibliographies</u>" under Publications on the DGS website.

Many are organized by genealogical record types, such as military, probate, and census. Often they include a catchall category: "Et Cetera". It was never abbreviated.

Our story begins, like all good mysteries, with a series of seemingly unrelated facts, events, and people: a street curb, two professors, a shopping center, a phone book, and a chance encounter at a library.

Once, not so long ago, there was a black

community, Little Egypt, which was founded by a former slave on thirty acres along Northwest Highway in what is now the Lake Highlands neighborhood of Dallas. For eighty years, little Egypt existed, and then, in a single day in 1962, this community of about 200 people (many of whom were related) completely disappeared, seemingly leaving behind no trace of its existence.

North Texas Chapter of Germans from Russia Forms in the DFW Area Duane Stabler Germans from Russia settled in the mid-west areas of the USA from West Texas all the way to North Dakota and within time into southern Canada. They also settled in other locations including Colorado, Washington, and California. As the name implies, these people arrived in the USA from Russia where they had settled along the Volga River in the late 1700s and the area north of Odessa (currently Ukraine) in the early 1800s. These immigrating Germans originated from various parts of Germany and were originally invited to come to Russia by a manifest signed by Catherine the Great.


Tips and Tricks from the 8th Floor Genealogy Section
