
Join Us for the DGS General Meeting on April 1st

Sharpen Your DNA Skills Using Videos from RootsTech



DGS Donations to the Dallas Public Library Approach \$800,000



The Dallas Genealogical Society recently made a \$3,980 donation to fund a 12-month technical support contract for the i2S CopiBook scanner that the society purchased for the Dallas Public Library in 2018.

Located in the Heritage Lab on the 8th floor of the J. Erik Jonsson Central Library, the i2S is the only scanner of its type available to the public in the DFW region. Funding for the room that contains the scanner (and other digitization equipment) was also provided by DGS in 2018.
